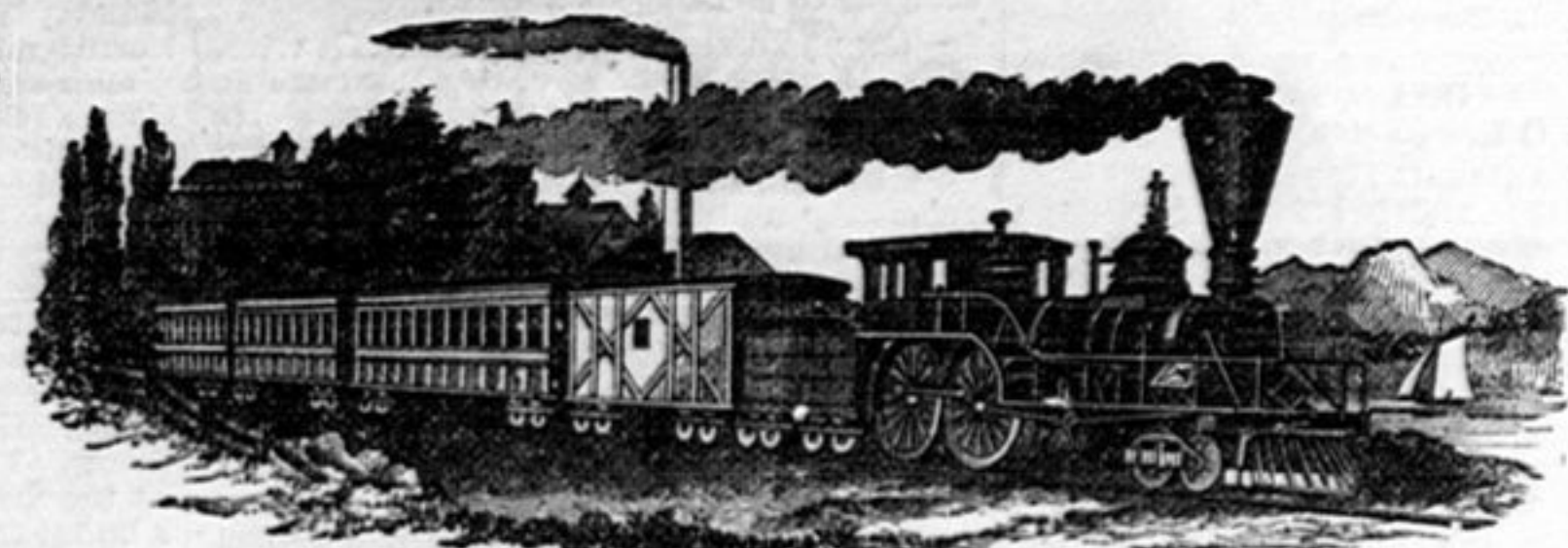

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Mr J R Stratton, M. P. P. for West Peterboro, recently closed a series of meetings, about twenty in number, wherein he made addresses to his constituents in review of the legislation of the last session of the Ontario assembly. In doing so Mr. Stratton follows a commendable English practice. Mr. Stratton's review was instructive and interesting and was highly appreciated by the electors of all shades of politics. Mr. Stratton is so active and energetic in looking after the material interests of his constituency that his majority of 450 at the last election will probably be advanced to a thousand.

Retiring President Geary, at the meeting of the Oxford dairymen's association said, in reply to a question, that he "had experimented with four hogs during August and September, feeding wheat. The result was that he had bought Manitoba frosted wheat at 50 cents a bushel, and fed it. Taking the weight of the hogs when he began to feed them and when he sold them, he calculated he sold the wheat for between 84 and 85 cents a bushel. He had experimented with feeding the wheat both dry and wet, and the best results were from the dry chopped. He declared with confidence that with the price of wheat at 61 or 63 cents a bushel it would be much more profitable to feed it to hogs." This is worth the attention of our farmers.

The president and sundry members of the Young Conservative Club of Toronto have dared to express opinions about the Dominion government's policy that do not meet with the approval of its machine member and the "250,000 watchdog," as Mr. Chapleau dubs The Empire. The club had a warm debate the other night and one member actually had the courage to declare that there were more native born Canadians in Chicago than in Toronto and more in the United States than in Canada. This was hard on the N. P., and it made the hair on the head of J. Castell-Hopkins of the Empire stand on end. Though they say his head is in external adornment like Nicholas Flood Davin's. The young club's "bolt for freedom" is the sensation of the day in the city; and there is a wide feeling that the empire—not the paper—may crumble to pieces if the club cannot be welded into "One Harmonious whole" by the organ's own watchdogs.

Our genial friend, Farmer John A. McGillivray of Uxbridge, carries his politics into farming to such an extent that contemporaneous with the appointment of Mr. Mowat's dehorning commission he has taken to the public advocacy of the Dorset breed of sheep. One of the strong points—in fact two of the strong points of that breed is its horns. With these appendages the animal is more easily handled; you do not have to grab and tear the wool. The breed is hardy, is admirably adapted to our climate, it matures early and is very prolific, and the wool is fine and strong. Mr. McGillivray has had a herd of Dorsets for several years and can speak from personal experience. The breed is well worthy the attention of farmers who desire to give their attention to sheep-raising, a branch that will undoubtedly prove profitable in the future as the barriers to free access to the market across the lines will now soon be removed. We expect to say something more about this breed in a future issue. Those desiring information should communicate with Mr. McGillivray at Uxbridge.

The Globe of Tuesday sounds a note of warning which reformers in this county should heed. It says: "While a great mass of the people entertain strong objections to the introduction of federal or provincial politics into municipal elections, there are disturbing signs that a surreptitious attempt is to be made to gain a conservative party advantage in the municipal elections all over the province next January. It is stated that the word has been passed out from conservative headquarters that an attempt must be made to get as many party men into the township councils as possible next year, with the object of influencing the appointment of assessors. Rightly or wrongly, it is believed that next year's assessment roll, which is the basis of the Dominion and provincial election lists, will be of electoral importance with respect to one or other of these lists. It is therefore deemed highly desirable that good conservative assessors should have the superintendency of their preparation. Of course the thing was to be managed in such a way as not to arouse the suspicion of the liberals. The secret instructions however as usual, have leaked out. Liberals are strongly averse to complicating the election by the problems of municipal management with the federal issues, but the actions of their adversaries must be closely watched, and double-dealing of any kind must be promptly challenged and made abortive."
