

VICTORIA FALL ASSIZES. SIMMONS V. MINTZ, -Our report of this action

The plaintiff did not ask at the trial for special damages, but simply for a vindiosdamages only. On this the jury found one dol-lar damages to the plaint ff, the judge giving an

Weese v. O'Neill. O'Leary procured a loan from Bryans to pay off O'Nelli's mortgage to Weese, and a paper purporting to be a discharge of the Weese mortkage was registered. This discharge Weese claimed to be a forgery. The action Weese v O'Neil was an action to foremortgage void. The principal question was, whose agent was O'Leary? Judgment reserved.
