CANADA'S BUILDING. A two minutes' walk along the lake front brings you'to Canada's building-a plain, square structure, with; a round tower in front. IIt is surrounded by broad verandahs. and altogether is a very nice building. wish I could say the same of the interior, We had gone there first, like loyal Cana dians, to register, and the fonly thing of interest we found in the building were some old friends who happened there like curselves. The men, women and children are dressed in white linen suits, with the capotes for their heads. When I say white linen you will understand, of course, that it was originally white. There are always two or three men about with their long whips ready to whip out of the ground any compressed in by a visitor.
