-A noteworthy piece of work has just been turned out at Dundas by the Messrs. John Bertram & Sons of the Canada Tool Works. It is what is stated to be the largest turning lathe ever built in Canada, and was constructed for the Nova Scotia Steel Co, of New Glasgow, to be used for turning heavy steamboat shafts and forgings. It takes in a shaft 34 feet long and will swing over the bed 60 inches, and S feet in the break. When tested on Satu:day this lathe reduced a 14-inch shaft four inches at a cut, and will do a great deal better when put on a proper foundation. -South-bound Iron Mountain train No. 51 was held up by seven masked bandits at Oliphant, a small station seven miles north of Newport, Ark., at 10 o'clock last Friday night. As soon as the train was brought to a standstill the gang began firing into the express car and a panic occurred among the crew and passengers. Conductor W. P. McNally, however, rushed out to the platform and fired into the attacking party. His shots were returned and he fell mortally wounded. The express messenger was overpowered without much trouble and the safe forced open and emptied of its contents. The robbers then turned their attention to the passenger coaches, and those who had not safely hidden away their valuables were quickly relieved of them. After robbing the train the robbers galloped away and the train proceeded to Little Rock.

-A Capetown despatch of Friday last says: Later reports by messengers from the force acting against the Matabeles have been received, and confirm the report already sent out of the complete defeat of King Lobengula's forces, the capture of the capital and the scattering of the Impi For four days there was desultory firing on both sides, and it was evident that the Matabeles were waiting for an opportunity to make a general attack. This came on the morning of Ost. 31, and between night and dawn a black herd was seen advancing upon the British, who were well prepared for the battle. As soon as the Matabeles came within easy range the machine guns and Maxim rifles belched forth a leaden hail that nothing human could withstand, and it was hardly a moment before the advance was advanced was checked, and quickly turned into first a retreat and then a mad rush for cover. Over five hundred dead and wounded were left on the field, and it is believed that hundreds of others were carried away by their companions. Of the British forces only two were killed and six wounded.
