NEWS OF THE WEEK

**HOME AND FOREIGN ITEMS OF** INTEREST.

Gathered from the Telegraph and Exchanges.

-in some parts of England coal is selling at 60 shillings a ton. -The funeral of Sir Andrew Clark took

place on Saturday in Westminster Abbey. Mr. Gladstone was one of the pail-bearers. -The claims of the British Columbia sealers against the United States, amounting to \$1,000,000, have been forwarded to

the Dominion government. -An Italian laborer named Pasquale Purchio, about 30 years of age, was murdered at Mount Morris, near Rochester, Saturday night last for about \$15 which he had on his person at the time. The

murderers are unknown. -Richard Savage, of Halifax, aged 27 shot his wife Maggie, aged 26, and his child Richard, aged 4, last week. Sayage was a horse car conductor in New York. but did not live happily with his family. He was jesious of his wife and often threatened to kill her.

-Edward McKenny and Jasper Carr, colored waiters, got into a discussion over a game of poker last Saturday night in New York and fought with knives. The men ran into the street, and after fighting for nearly a block McKenny stabbed Carr through the heart, killing him instantly.

-James Johnson, formerly a York blacksmith, cut his threat in the presence of his tweive-year old son, near Regina last week. He was separated from his wife, who left him owing to ill-treatment For beating her he had been treated to a coat of tar and feathers some short time previously.

-The Midland Free Press says:-There was a corner in pork in town on Tuesday. A procession of farmers' wagons ended a Grise's corner and unloaded about one hundred live hogs to be weighed. The purchaser was Geo. Matthews, of Peterboro The price paid was \$5.25 per cwt. The farmers received about \$2,000 in cash.

-During the performance at a theatre at Barcelona, Spain, one night last week, a bomb was thrown from the gallery to the floor. An explosion and panic followed in which 15 persons lost their lives and a great many were injured. It is believed to be the work of anarchists, several of whom have been arrested.

-Richard Hartigan, aged about 55 years, engineer at the Niagara Falls, N. Y., waterworks station, fell into the water pit Wednesday of last week while raking out weeds from the rack. He was swept over the gates, the water being high, and carried down the overflow pipe and hurled on the rocks 120 feet below in the gorge of the river. His body was recovered by four men. It was fearfully mutilated, and death must have been instantaneous.

-Native sples who have been among the Matabele report at Fort Victoria that Lopengula's warriors are utterly disheartened. Their impis have been broken and they wander in disorganized bands through the country. The men of the Clartered Company are said to be on Lobengula's track. As all the Matabeles are suffering for want of food and shelter from the rains, they are expected to offer soon to submit to the company's terms.

-The propeller Al bany, of the Western Transit Co., loaded with grain, and the propeller Philadelphia, loaded with coal and general merchandise, two of the argest freight boats on the lakes, collided off Port Aux Barques, Mich., in the dense fog last Tuesday night, and both sank shortly after in 200 feet of water. The Philadelphia struck the Albany. All hands got on board the Philadelphia, and she towed the Albany half an hour, when the latter sank. The Philadelphia went down 30 minutes later.

-Prince Henry of Battenburg, husband of Prince Beatrice, youngest daughter of the queen, while inspecting Armstrong gun works at Elswick Wednesday sustain ed an injury to his left eye. It is not re ported his condition is serious and he will perhaps lose the sight of his eye.

-Harry Browning, the 16-year-son of Dr Browning, of Exeter, Ont., while walking in his sleep some weeks ago, fell thirty feet out of a third-story window. His skull was terribly fractured, and his death seemed inevitable. He lingered on, however, and now after lying 49 days unconscious he has recovered the full use of his intelligence and is in a fair way to recovery.

-A despatch from Fort Victoria, Mashaonaland, dated Monday, say the report that King Lobengula had been captured was erroneous. Lobengula has rallied his force? and has returned rapidly to the vicinity of Buluwago, where he is apparently awaiting an attack by the whitee. The latter are keeping behind the temporary defences they have thrown up. A battle is im--Senator S. Parker was found dead at his

home in Toledo, O., Sunday evening with his heart broken-literally as well as figuratively broken-for the organ was rent in twain. His sudden death was the culmination of continued brooding over the misdeeds of his son, S. E. Parker. Two weeks ago the latter was arrested on a charge of forging the name of his uncle, Dr. Sewell S. Parker.

-Sansational disclosures are expected outhing irregularities in the Prussian military commissariat. A large wholesale butcher of Berlin is about to be presecuted for supplying the army with diseased meat. His firm, which is a long established one, provides two army corps with meat, and is reputed to clear a profit of 700 000 marks yearly. A bookkeeper who was discharged by the firm some time ago has reported to the war office that certain buyers for the army received regular presents from the firm, and that the firm was allowed to purvey any kind of meat it chose. The progress of the enquiry suggests the belief that the outbreak of typhoid fever in certain regiments was due to bad meat

-Five years ago a Russian princess who died in Paris left by will \$1,000,000 to the person who would consent to remain for the space of one year in the chapel which is erected over her tomb in the cemetery of Pere LaChaise. The princess lies in a crystal coffin; thus the whole body is distinctly visible, and this is what causes so much fright to all who have as yet attemptel to gain the prize. The will forbide all visitors. The candidates must be alone with the dead for a whole year before the million dollars are won. No work is allowed. Books and newspapers, however, are permitted, and a servant brings meals regularly to the watcher. One hour's walk a day is also allowed, but this must be undertaken before 5 o'clock in the morning in summer and 8 o'clock during the winter months. Several Frenchmen have essayed to win the prize, but all have given up after a short trial. One lasted out three weeks, by which time he had completely lost his reason, and still remains a jabbering idiot. The will makes no mention of foreigners being ineligible. There is every chance, therefore, for a strong-minded American who fears neither ghosts, ghouls nor gravestones to become rich in the short period of 365 days. Applications to be made to the

He bled so profusely that he died before the doctor had succeeded in tying the arteries.

-About 10 o'clock Saturday morning last a young man named Joseph Bunn, son of Mr. George Bunn, postmaster of Ullswater, committed suicide. The unfortunate young man's body was discovered lying face downwards in about six inches of water. He had been hopelessly ill for about eight years, and had several times threatened to do away with himself if he did not get better soon.

-On Saturday forenoon of last week a son of Mr. George Pickens, of Longford Mills, took a rayolver from his father's house, and went with some companions to shoot at a target in the schoolhouse shed. The second shot hung fire, and the lads gathered round to ascertain what was wrong, when the pistol was discharged, the bullet entering the stomach of Duncan, son of Mr. Duncan Comrie. The wound was such that when the boy drank the water would pass out through the opening Duncan walked home and a surgeon was sent for, but the lad gradually sank, until he died at 7 o'clock on Sunday evening. He was fourteen years of age.

-Mr. Crawford Goffatt last week prought from the United States a natural curiosity in the "Mexican jumping bean, which is scarcely a bean, but probably grows in a round capsule like the seed of morning glory, the seeds being roughly triangular like the three portions of a divided apple. They are half as large again as coffee seeds. Their peculiarity is that they frequently start suddenly, or roll in various directions so that if not safely enclosed they are soon lost. The motions are quite inexplicable and go on alike in light or dark, no sensible contraction or expansion occurs, and there are no hairs or projections which we might suppose necessary to locomotion.-[Packet.

-Eddie Brown, a lad of 15 years, was the victim of a very sad and distressing accident at the Lakeport canning factory set Friday week, by which he lost his left arm. While working at the apple paring machine he jumped upon a table and tried to adjust a belt, and while doing this his left arm caught in a loop and in a trice he was whirled round the shaft. 
