OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, November 2nd, 1893. Toronto Live Stock Market.

Some 43 loads of fresh supplies came in Tuesday morning, and there were in addition a couple o loads of North-west cattle left over from the receipts of last week. Except that there was a slight improvement in the quality of a few loads of cattle and that prices were a little better when sold, there is no change in the general state o the market. Good to choice butchers' cattle could be quoted to-day at from 3 to 350, but the latter figure was only occasionally touched; secondry and common stuff ranged from 2 7-8 to 21c per 1b. Three steers averaging 1,100 lbs. each, sold at 31c per lb. Stockers were in fair demand, and fetched a little better prices owing to improved quality. One load, averaging 1,10 1bs sold at 4jc per lb; a load, averaging 1 100 ibs Newly-calved milkers were in request this
