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REPORT OF THE FIRE AND WATER COMMITTEE.

Reeve KYLIE, chairman, presented the report, which stated that the committee had been called together on Oct. 23rd to consider the placing of a hydrant in the Rathburn Co. yard.

Coun. KILLABY said he would move an amendment that the hydrant asked by the Rathburn firm be granted—they desired no bonus or remission of taxes, and if the town would not at least protect their business from fire it was manifesting a poor spirit towards such an important industry.

Mayor WALTERS admitted that he was surprised at the action of the committee at a previous meeting 8 members of the council out of 10 had supported the putting in of a hydrant.

Coun. GRAHAM said the committee had come to the conclusion, when the ground had been measured, that the mill would be no better protected with one hydrant than it was at present.

Coun. KILLABY said the firm wished protection for their stock in the yards, which was not fully insured.

Dep. reeve ROBSON supposed the case of the mill being burned down, and the company intimating that they would rebuild here if the town would grant them two hydrants—would not every citizen gladly grant the request?

Coun. GRAHAM said that Dep. reeve ROBSON was imagining a case and inventing arguments to bolster it up.

Dep. reeve CRANDELL pointed that there were \$600 of the ratepayers' money in the wagon, which was practically useless at present.

OUR CITY FATHERS.

A MEETING OF COUNCIL HELD MONDAY EVENING. Communications—Interesting Discussion upon Charity Matters—The Joint Committee Recommends Renting the old Mansion House as a Home for the Aged Poor—The Rathburn Mill Hydrant—Why the New Hook and Ladder Wagon is not Used.

A regular meeting of the town fathers was held last evening in the council chamber. All the members were present, and the attendance of a large number of ratepayers indicated that a hint had gone abroad that the proceedings would be somewhat interesting.

From A. Goheen, stating that a drain on Queen-st., east of St. Patrick-st., had been diverted from its former course, to the damage of his property.—Street and bridge committee.

From S. Swanton, asking to be placed on the assessment roll as tenant of the Blackwell residence on Kent-st. west.—Finance committee.

From J. S. McCarty, offering to rent the old Mansion house on Victoria avenue to the council as a home for the aged poor at \$15 per month, with privilege of purchasing for \$2,000.—Laid on table.

From Alex. Frame, asking that five double windows be placed on the house rented by him from the town.—Town property committee, with power to act.

From the secretary of the Central Charity Committee, enclosing report stating that the committee had examined the Mansion house and found it well adapted for the purposes of a home for the aged poor; there would be room available for the reception of sick persons thrown on the council's hands.

From the secretary of the fire brigade, calling attention to the darkness of the hall on many days, caused by the hay-shed shutting out the light; also pointing out that the new hook and ladder wagon could not be taken to fires, as one team of horses could not do all the work.
