In a recent case a letter addressed to a commerciai traveler, who was about to visit a certain place, was sent away from the post-office of that place to a aboring office for the altogether inspilicient reason that no person by the name mentioned in the address was accustomed to call at the first office, while a person of similar name was known to live near the second office. The result was that the letter was opened by a wrong party and the proper addresse failed to receive it, to his great inconvenience and disappointment. It would greatly help to insure prompt delivery of letters intended for commercial travelers, if parties posting such letters would endeavor so to address them as to make it evident that they are not inteded for permanent residents of the same name in the localities where they are to be

The marriage of Miss Corinne Tasereau, daughter of Judge Taschereau of the Supreme Court, to Lieut. Panet, R.E., son of Col. Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia, took place in the Sacred Heart Church this morning. It was a very swell affair, the elite of Ottawa society being present. They will remain in England until after Christmas, when they leave for India, where Lieut. Panet will resume his duties in the Imperial army.

A ton of minfature fish was thrown into the river on Saturday, some averaging only 20 to the pound. Prof. Prince points out that the law at present providesagainst catching of any miniature fish except pike. He will report to the Minister on the subject matter of the

Lighthouse-keeper David Foster at Port Colborne, in his report to the Marine Department, says: "Not for 35 years has the water been lower in Lake Erie than it is to-day. In the Welland Canal it is only 11 feet 11 inches on the mitre sills." Mr. Foster in closing his letter states his opinion that the deeper the channel is made the lower the water will be. Vessels are carrying from 14,000 to 20,000 bush-

els less than their capacity. Advices received at the Fisheries Department show that 11 New England ashing vessels have been lost this season off the coasts of Canada and Newfoundland, their value being \$70,000. Ninety lives were lost on these vessels, most of the victime being Canadians. The Government has received no advices of seizures by the Russians of any Canadian sealing vessels in Okhotsk Sea. If any are in custody, as reported, they must be American. All Canadian vessels are either at home or are wintering in Japan. The Oknotsk Sea is, moreover, not a famous sealing ground. There is only one, rookery there: from which an American company procured 1900 seals in 1893,

and the year before none at all.

A PRINCE FOR SALE. He Will Give His Title and Himself For

\$2,000,000 in Cold Cash. New York, Nov. 11.-An American heiress, with \$2,000,000 and a desire for the title of Princess, may communicate with Pastor J. Berger, of the Roman Catholic Church of Leopold, Perry County, Ind. The \$2,000,000 must be in cold cash or convertible securities. A slight discount may be made on

Lawyer Albert S. Warner of No. 271 Broadway a couple of days ago received the subjoined letter, written in French, on the official notepaper of the church in question:

"Sir,-Hearing that you take charge of affairs of all kinds, I would like you to undertake to bring about a marriage, in regard to which I beg to make the following proposition: A young French Prince, a friend of mine, desires to contract a marriage in America with a young person (jeune personne), who has at least \$2,000,000. Can you secure such an individual for him? If you can you will be paid after the marriage the sum of \$10,000, as commission, which will be guaranteed to you. If you carry the matter through on or before Dec. 1 you will receive an extra compensation of \$5000, as the need is urgent. The young Prince in question belongs to the most illustrious family of the French nobility. His title dates back to the time of the crusades. He is 29 years of age and a Catholic. He desires that the young person should also be a Catholic, but the religious question will not necessarily be an obstacle to an otherwise satisfactory marriage.

"If you will undertake this affair of the heart, please let me hear from you at once. If, however, you cannot, will you kindly give me the address of some company which undertakes this class of business? Receive, I beg of you, my respectful salutations.

"J. BERGER, Pastor." "The Church of Leopold." He now proposes to send the application blanks to all marriageable females who are possessed of the required number of dollars. Some Have Been in Collision and Others

Are Stranded-Loss of Life. London, Nov. 11.-While the tug Flying Cormorant was towing the Italian ship F. S. Ciampa off Queenstown in a gale to-day, the hawser parted, killing one of the crew of the tug. The tug returned to Queenstown. The British steamer Erasmus Wilson had her bows slightly damaged by

collision with the British steamer Appomatox at Millwall to-day. The British steamer Poplar is ashore off Sunderland. Her crew have signalled with rockets for assistance. The British steamer Sinbad is stranded off Blyth and will probably prove a done much damage to property.

Burned at Sea.

L ..don, Nov. 11.-The British ship Avoca, Captain Millichamp, from Calcutta, October 5, for Boulogne, has been burned at sea. Her chief mate, carpenter, an apprentice and seven seamen have landed at Padang, Sumatra.

Ship Ashore at Cardiff. London, Nov. 11.-The Norwegian barque Riverside, Captain Nielson, from Chatham, N.B., October 15, for Cardiff, is ashore on Cardiff Sands.

Five Men Lost. Nassau, N.B., Nov. 11.-The Ward line steamer Niagara, Captain Crocker, from New York Nov. 6, for Cienfuegos, arrived here to-day. She reports that on Friday morning, Nov. 'S, she ran down and sank the American barque William Hales, Captain Coombs, from Havana, Oct. 27, for Philadelphia, off Cape Henlopen. Captain Coombs, the mate and five seamen of the William Hales were saved and five men were lost. Details of the disaster will be cabled as soon as obtained.

NEWFOUNDLAND AND CANADA.

Premier Whiteway Coming to Renew th Negotiations Looking to Confederation with the Dominion.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 12.-The Telegram, the Government organ, announces that shortly after the arrival of Governor Murray, who is due about the end of the month, Premier Whiteway will leave on a visit to Canada. It expresses no definite opinion upon the object of his mission, but the prevailing opinion is that he goes to seek to reopen the confederation negotiations, it being almost a foregone conclusion that the colony cannot exist beyond another year as a self-governing one. The same paper urges the Government to appoint Sir Ambrose Shea, ex-Governor of the Bahamas, who is now visiting here, as Commissioner of the colony in London.

GOING SOUTH FOR SEALS.

The Arctic Sealing Grounds Cleaned Out-Now the Antartic Will Be Raided.

New York, Nov. 11.-Having practically cleaned out the seals from the Arctic, the sealers have turned their attention again to the Antarctic, once the sealing ground of the world, but abandoned 50 years ago for the same reason that is now causing the abandonment of the Arctic. A representative of the syndicate of sealers that controls all the British sealing schooners hunting in the Arctic grounds left San Francisco for Australia on the last mail steamship, with the purpose of interviewing the Australian Governments as to the concessions, and of making an expedition to the southern grounds to learn from examination the actual condition of things. Archie Hughes, one of the most fam-

ous seal hunters of the Pacific coast, was selected to make the trip, and his mission was kept secret until after he had sailed.

It is generally admitted by the old sealers that devastation amounting almost to wholesale destruction has been wrought among the seal herds of the north. More than 100,000 seals were caught this year, and the hunters do not hesitate to express their belief that this represents a very large portion of the entire herd. So, unless the sealing business is to suffer rapid decline and speedy extinction, something must be done right away. While the negotiations with the Australian Governments are to be made in behalf of the British syndicate, it is expected as soon as matters are arranged the San Francisco schooners will sail for the south along with the Victoria vessels. There is aid to be some sort of an understanding to this effect.

They Demand \$14 a Week. Ten Hours'

Rest Per Day and Other Things. New York, Nov. 11 .-- Nearly 400 members of the Liberty Dawn Association of Coach Drivers were ordered to strike at 5 p.m. to-day in the following stables : Pitney, Seach, King, Hall, Overin and Markert. These hotels were thereby deprived of their carriage service, Waldorf, New Netherland, Plaza, Savoy, Buckingham, Wind-Cambridge, Metropole, Murray Hill, Vendome and St. Cloud, and the Manhattan, Knickerbocker and Union

League Clubs. Messrs. Hall, Markert, King and Overin promptly conceded the demand of the organization and the drivers immediately returned to work. Sixtyfive men employed by Messrs. Seach to the chief magistracy who is not a total and Pitney were still on strike late today. As a consequence the carriages at the Waldorf and Holland hotels

and the Knickerbocker Club are still tied up. The demands of the coach drivers are for the employment of union men only and that the minimum rate of wages shall be \$14 a week. They also demand that every man shall have ten hours' rest from all labor and responsibility, the time to be measured from time the driver stops works until he reports for duty again. Other demands are for one night off a week after 6 p.m., and one hour each for of 100 per cent. dinner and supper.


