Lindsay and Pembroke. We have often asserted that the natura. advantages of Lindsay are hardly surpass ed by those of any other town in Canada, and that it mainly rests with the inhabitants of this town and county-for the county is almost equally interested-to unite and work cordially together to have those advantages developed as soon as possible. In such action politics and partylsm of every kind should be rigidly excluded. We think that we lately missed the great advantage of having a competing road—the C. P. R.—running through this town and county ; in fact we may say that to save a penny in tax we have lost a pound in other ways, but as this cannot be helped it will be wisdom on our part to give such moral and, if necessary, such material aid to other projects as will benefit this town and county. It is not at present generally known that there is a railway called the Ottawa, Arnprior and Parry Sound rail-Toronto during Thanksgiving holidays way, which is now nearly completed. Amprior is a town close to the Ottawa river and about 100 miles nearer Montreal than the Mattawa, the point to which the railroad from Haliburton was to be continued. To have connection with the Parry Sound road would give us connection also with Pembroke, about 65 east of Mattawa, which we think would be more advantageous to us than connection with the latter place, as was at first intended. Now we learn that the people of Pembroke are very anxious to have connection with the Parry Sound road, some miles to the south of that town, and then to follow on and connect at Haliburton. Should this be accomplished, and the probabilities are favorable, Lindsay will be in a much better position than if the road were extended to the Mattawa, as at first projected. The advantages of such a connection would, we think, greatly benefit the trade of this town, and we may refer to this subject in a future issue.
