Good Bread. At a bread making contest held in an eastern city not long ago, a milling company offered prizes ranging from \$5 to \$100 for the best loaves of bread. The receipe used by the winner of the \$100 was Toree pints of water, one-half pint of milk, one tablespoonful of sugar, one tablespoonful of lard, two tablespoonfuls of salt and one yeast cake. The ingredients, which were first thoroughly mixed, and then kneaded ten minutes, were raised over night in a covered bread pan. In the morning the dough was kneaded ten mirutes and made into three loaves. Three other loaves entered for the contest were awarded \$75 prizes. One of these loaves seem to have been prepared in a some-what unusual way. The ingredients for third water, compressed yeast, and a little salt and sugar, and were mixed with enough flour to make a stiff dough. This dough was mixed, kneaded, and set to rise at night. When light it was chopped thoroughly with a chopping knife, made into loaves, and set to rise the second time; when this was light it was baked forty minutes.


