> In the days of which I write a convict ily upon every wrong-coer. Offenders who would not get more than three months in jeil to-day were then sent away for five or ten years. The embezzler and the murderer were treated alike until they arrived at the Bay. Then a little difference was made in the favor of the former, though the place was a hell upon earth for all, according to every man's testimony. Where a big batch was taken the government sent along from eight to twelve marines and an officer to take entire charge of the prisoners. 
