THE LATE FATHER CONNELLY.

A Short Sketch of the Life of a Popular

The diocese of Peterboro and the parish of Hastings lost another faithful and zealous priest on Sunday morning by the death of Rev. Father Michael Connelly. During the past summer Father Connelly was driving in the country with a livery

horse, which became unmanageable and threw him from the buggy, causing injuries which, it is thought, with other complications, sciatica in particular, resulted in his death. He was born in that town 48 years ago and was a son of the late Edward Connelly. His parents died several years ago. The son was educated at the schools of Perth and afterwards, deciding to enter the priesthood, studied at Regiopolis College Kingston, going from there to the Montreal seminary. Ven. Archdeacon Casey, of the Cathedral staff, and Father Connelly had always been closely associated, privately as well as in the church, for they were ordained to the priesthood together on May 28th, 1872, at Smith's Fails, by His Lordship Bishop Horan. Both Archdescon Casey and Father Connelly celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of their ordination, their silver jubilee, during the past summer. After his ordination Father Connelly remained three months in charge of the parish at Smith Falls while the parish priest, Rav. Father Ciunan, was absent in the old country. Father Connelly then went to Belleville, where he remained two years. He was labored until 1893 and during his pastorate built a residence. In 1893, when Ven. Archdeacon Casey was removed to Peterporo, Father Connolly was appointed to succeed him at Campbellford, and after being there a short time he was removed to Hastings to fill the vacancy created by the death of Rev. Father Quirk. While there he built a new presbytery. By the death of Father Connelly Hastings loses its second priest within three years.
