An Electric Railway Scheme.

VERY MUCH OF THE BOBBYSON IS all agreed upon a scheme to secure electric railway communication with Peterboro.

The proposal is to build a line to Scott's mills, some 12 miles east, thence south to Peterboro. By taking the above route, expensive bridges would be avoided, and the high falls at the Gull River outlet and at Barfield could be utilized to generate power. The project is a large one and it is believed that provincial and Dominion aid, as well as bonuses from the benefited municipalities, will be secured.

It has been figured out that the line can be built for less than \$200,000. Mr. W. J. Read is secretary of the provincial committee, and is hard at work on the details.
