LAST SALE FOR THE SEASON HELD ON FRIDAY.

Over 2,100 Boxes Boarded and High Prices Obtained-Financial Matters Arranged and Instructor Ward Re-Engaged for Next Sea on.

The closing sale of the Victoria county cheese board for the season of 1899 was held on Friday morning in the market chamber, and was well attended. The officers were all present and everyone was in good humor, having had a prosperous season. The buyers present were Messrs. Fitzgerald, Whitton, Rollins and Flavelle,

It being the final meeting, over an hour was taken up in the settlement of the board's financial affairs, and arranging for the payment of the Inspector's salary of \$200, towards which the board decided to temporarily advance \$30 while the patrons of a few slow-paying factories were communicated with.

The Inspector's Visits. President Robertson reported that several factories objected to paying the assessment fixed on the ground that Inspector. Ward had not made the promised number of visits, but it was generally admitted that the Inspector had proved himself to be a first-class man and strictly impartial in the performance of his duty. If the factories wished to place a good article on the English market the makers must be assisted and advised in their work, and as the meeting was a representative one he hoped they would make up their mind to re-engage Mr. Ward now, as they might be unable to get him next

Mr. Whitton applauded the idea. was true that Peterboro, a large board, only paid \$200, but Victoria county factories received more visits. Among the Canadians associated in this enterprise are: Hon. R. Harcourt, J. Kendry, M. P., (president Auburn Power Company, Peterboro), R. J. McLaughlin, F. W. Barratt and Dr. Edward Adams, Toronto.

It is proposed to at once transmit some 2000 horse power to Peterboro, Lakefield and Lindsay for electric ighting and power purposes. Some 50,000 yearly revenue has already been secured in these towns, including the town lighting contract for 10 years in Lindsay.
