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Hunting Notes. Dr. Giles, Warden of Haliburton county, shipped a magnificent buck weighing 250 lbs. to Mr. Sam Suddaby, Brantford, on Tuesday.

The first big shipment of deer passed through from the north Friday in charge of returning parties of hunters from Stouffville, Port Hope, Bowmanville and Uxbridge.

The Sinclair-Sadie party, comprising 13 members, have had grand sport in Anson township. They have secured two deer and will break up camp to-day, Friday.

A party of four Port Perry hunters returned from the north on Monday's train, with six fine bucks and two does. They report as a very big party and that the antlers are particularly fine.

Chief Game Warden Tinsley estimates that there are 8,000 hunters in the woods now searching for the humble deer. The department sent out over 5,000 deer licenses and 3,000 antlers' permits.

Messrs. R. Miller and Chas. Jackson, of the Flaville mills, returned on Thursday from the Simpson-Haggarty camp below Bobcaygeon. They did not succeed in killing any deer owing to unfavorable weather—so they relate—but the fact that each gained over five pounds in weight leads their friends to suspect that they devoted considerable attention to the fragrant and appetizing venison stew while at camp.

A nice lot of venison was displayed opposite the Express office on Wednesday. There were 11 deer in the pile, and as no 'mountain lamb' has yet been offered for sale in town this season, citizens are casting glances at the tempting sight. The venison belonged to Wm. White, Thos. Hartley, Adam McCabe, Wm. Stafford, Wm. Mulesky, Joe Lytle, Jas. Patton and Alex. Hartley, the two latter residing in East On. The party hunted in Snowdon township, and killed two deer per man.
