

Toronto Live Stock Market. Receipts Tuesday were 25 loads, consisting o 264 sheep and lambs, 110 hogs and the reminder cattle. Last week the receipts were 1,287 cattle, 311 sheep and lambs and 693 hogs. Business seemed to be all in one line Tuesday, viz., butchers' cattle, and outside of this it was very dull. In hogs, sheep and calves there was little or no business, the largest dealers saying that they might just as well have been at home for all they had done. One lot of cattle were bought for Montreal. There was quite a number of

for Montreal. There was quite a number of butchers present, and some were quite heavy purchasers of fairly good stock for the Christmas trade. The demand was not nearly as large as it has been in other years, and as it appears to be already supplied it makes the prospects for the remainder of the week very duil.

Cattle—Butchers' cattle were in good demand and the stock for sale was much better than that shown has week. Real good stock brought \$1.25 per cwt, and there was quite a number of sales of this class Inferior and rough cows brought from 2½c to 2½c; and good, 3 to 3½c.

Among the transactions were:

10 heifers, averaging 900 lbs at \$23 00 per head 4 25 per cwt 3 75 " 22 tmixed.

Milch cows—There were few in and trade was dull in this line. Two sold at \$36 per head, but outside of this there was little doing Stockers were dull; they brought from \$30 to \$35 per head and from \$3 to \$3 25 per cwt. There was nothing doing in bulls and no sales were noted. The

the reasons which may account for the dulness is that dressed hogs have been a big supply for the last three weeks, and the demand has not nearly equalled it.
