Mr. Thos. Walters, Mayor of Lindsay, Unantmously Nominated - Confident Determination to carry the Riding. Although but very short notice could be given, and the day was not favorable, the reform convention and mass meeting in the opera house Wednesday to select a candidate for the approaching South Victoria bye-election was the largest and most enthusiastic and most gratifying ever held in town. The reformers of the riding are to be congratulated upon their public spirit in turning out in such large numbers, and the confidence and determination exhibited all along the line is a most gratifying assurance that a strong, determined and confident effort will
