W. C. C. For God, and Home and Native Land. WORLD'S CONVENTION. Resolutions at the Great W. C. T. U. The great dual convention at Boston of the World's and the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, cosmopolitan in its character, religious in its nature, high in its aspirations and far-reaching in its sympathies, came to a close on Wednesday. "We have had many conventions," commented Miss Willard, "but, take it all in all, never have we had such a glorious convention." The following are the resolutions as amended and adopted: PROGRESS.

We, the members of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in 18th annual convention assembled, gratefully recognized the good hand of God in the progress made in the W. C. T. U. organization around the world during the past year; we also rejoice in the marvellous increase which is ours to record in membership and department work. We believe, as an organization, we have been called of God to carry on a great moral reform which demands from us such personal work and sacrifice, and that, looking towards the final victory which must eventually come, we are called to persevere in our efforts in the cause of total abstinence and prohibition, using such forces and adopting such measures as shall carry forward on a broad and liberal basis the work for God and humanity.

PROHIBITION. Inasmuch as total abstinence for the individual and legal prohibition for the state are fundamental principles of our work, (a) We would recognize the expediency of both phases of this great question in the prosecution of department work. (b) We extend a sisterly greeting to all organizations requiring total abstinence as a condition of membership, and rejoice that capitalists are perceiving the financial benefits of prohibition, by the many towns being established with a prohibitory clause in their charters and laws. (c) We note with thankfulness the recognition of women in the political field of the Catholic university of Washington in the founding of a Father Matthew professorship, and we approve most heartily of the efforts of our national president that John B. Gough be named as the first professor in the American university at Washington, and recommend the endowment of similar chairs in other institutions of higher education.

EVANGELISTIC EFFORTS. Resolved, that we urge a more diligent and systematic study of the word of God, and especially recommend the evangelistic course adopted by the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union as calculated to fit our women to become efficient and faithful workers in the world. Resolved, that we have from the first been hospitable in thought and action towards all accredited medical remedies for intemperance, but we emphasize the power of God to cure through repentance and faith turn us to him for salvation from sickness and sin.

WOMAN'S BALLOT. Recognizing the need of the purifying influence of women in the politics of the nation, and believing in the wisdom and necessity for the protection of women in all their interests, and especially necessary in securing prohibition, we are resolved, that we do earnestly urge our women to use every means practicable to secure equal governmental rights in state and church.

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION. Whereas the conditions of society and governmental life are so rapidly changing and dependent upon political action, and whereas, the nation is soon to enter its regular cycle of political contest; and whereas, it is an undeniable fact that the government is respectable which is not just; therefore, Resolved, that in behalf of the interests over which political action has so much influence and power, we declare ourselves unopposed to all parties that in any way protect the rights of the citizen.

UNCONSTITUTIONAL. And we declare it to be understood that there is nothing in our platform to debar any local union from rendering the assistance that it may deem best to any political organization.
