OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, Dec. 24, 1891. Toronto Live Stock Market.

Business was dull at the western cattle market Tuesday, some of the principal dealers staying in the yard only 10 or 15 minutes. Butchers are fairly well stocked up now and the unseasonable weather makes them more careful about buying, even when offers are away down. The offerings Tuesday were 15 loads, consisting of 475 sheep and lambs, 235 hogs and the reminder cattle. Cattle—A better class of cattle offered Tuesday would have found a readier sale. Butchers brought from \$3 25 to \$3.75 per cwt, \$4 being given only for one or two choice heifers. Inferior and rough cows brought from 2½ to 2½c.

Among the transactions were:—4 heifers, averaging 900 lbs, at \$30 per head; 2 cows, averaging 1,000 lbs, at \$26 per head.

Milch cows—A few inferior were offered for sale, but the demand was light for this class; better are wanted.

Stockers were dull, the price ranging from \$30 to \$35 per head, and \$3 to \$3 25 per cwt.
