been sold in town has been brought under the notice of the medical health officer, who is using every effort to bring those who were guilty of this breach of the provincial medical health act to justice. In the case in point a beef animal was affected with lump iaw, and killed and disposed of in town. The public have been warned from time to time through the press, and also by the bulletins issued by the provincial health department, which have set forth the act relating to the disposal of carcases of animals known to have been affected by disease, but in spite of these repeated warnings there are people who are so greedy and so utterly devoid of principle as to sell meat that is known to be unfit for food for the sake of the gain that may be derived therefrom.
