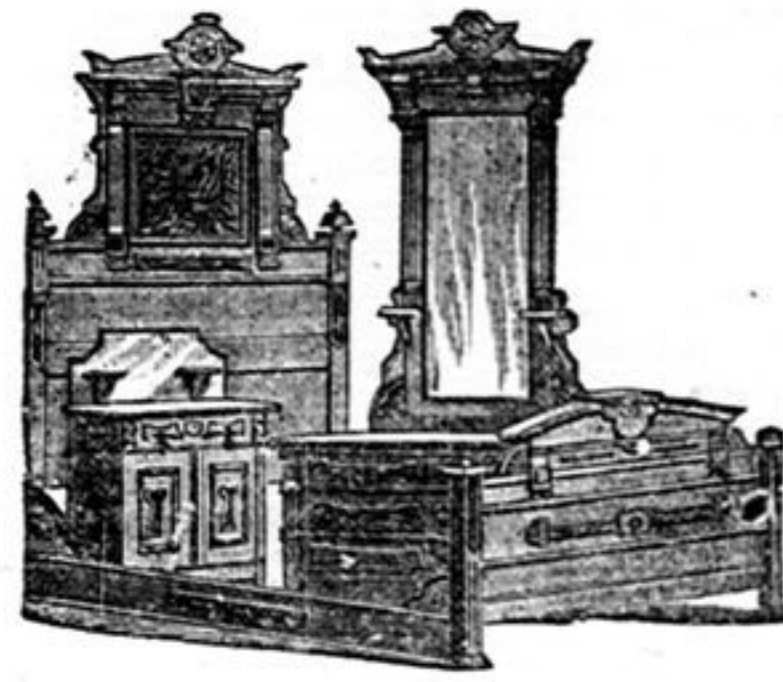

### LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL.

REGULAR MEETING—COMMUNICATIONS AND REPORTS—COUN. TOUCHBURN BROUGHT UP WITH A ROUND TURN—THE FIRE DEPARTMENT—THE DEPUTY RETURNING OFFICERS.

A regular meeting of the town fathers was held Monday evening last. The members present were Mayor Ray, Reeve Kyle, Dep. Reeves Walters and Crandell, and Couns. Keith, Bryans, Touchburn, Mallon, Johnston, Trill, Lovell and Head.

### COMMUNICATIONS.

From Geo. Hack, asking for remission of his taxes.—Referred to Finance Committee.

From C. H. Grantman, asking for a reduction of taxes on his east ward property, as the premises have been vacant some time.—Finance Committee.

From F. L. Semeriv, town engineer, giving \$30.50 as the total cost of the Wellington-st. sewer, of which amount \$24.50 was for labor.—Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Central charity committee, reporting an outlay up to date of \$85, leaving a deficit of \$23.50.—Sent to Finance Committee.

From the secretary of the fire brigade, reporting no fire in the town during the month of November.

Reeve Kyle said the firemen were grumbling, but without good cause. Until the present year they had been treated as the town's property, but now they were fairly comfortable, and well equipped. Everything could not be furnished for them, as the town was not in a position to spend the money. During the last three months there had not been a fire, and he hoped there would not be one during the remainder of the year. He felt confident that the men understood the position of affairs and would not complain, only for the fact that they were urged to do so by certain agitators. The town had spent the money on them this year, and he would be glad to see the men could wait until the next council act.

Coun. Head, the father of the scheme, read a report from the special committee appointed to consider the question of re-arranging the wards, recommending that the matter be left for the next council to deal with.—Adopted.

### THE FINANCE REPORT.

Coun. Head, the chairman, read the report, which recommended payment of accounts aggregating \$119.63. The report also favored the re-payment of \$100 to Mr. C. H. Grantman, as requested for remission of taxes was \$2,000.00.

### CELEBRATION FOR NEXT YEAR.

Coun. TOUCHBURN moved, seconded by Coun. BRYANS, that the clerk be instructed to ask for tenders for \$20,000 of cedar, to be used for the celebration of the centennial of the confederation of the Dominion of Canada, to be held in the year 1901.

Coun. HEAD suggested that the council also advertise for a quantity of field stone for the streets, but Coun. Touchburn demurred, holding that the spring was the best time. The stone should be broken after being placed on the streets, which would save handling twice.

### TO GET AT THE FACTS.

Coun. KEITH moved, seconded by Dep. Reeve WALTERS, that the council memorialize the Ontario government to define clearly what is assessable on telephone, telegraph and electric light poles.—Carried.

### THE OLD, OLD STORY.

Moved by Dep. Reeve CRANDALL, seconded by Coun. HEAD, that the time for the collection of taxes be extended until the 15th of January, B. F. Jewett to be collector.—Carried.

### THE WATERWORKS SUIT.

Coun. HEAD moved, seconded by Dep. Reeve CRANDALL, that those Stewart be associated with Town Solicitor Hopkins in the suit now going on between the town and the water-works company, and that the representatives of the stockholders of the company be invited to submit proposals to the town for the purchase of the works.—Carried.

Coun. MALLON and Touchburn objected to the employment of another solicitor.

Dep. Reeve CRANDALL said satisfactory progress was being made towards a settlement of the case in the town, and the committee thought it best to engage another solicitor rather than go to the expense of bringing one from Toronto.

Mayor RAY said the president of the company and a representative of \$28,000 worth of stock had been in town for several days, and the committee were trying to arrange for the purchase of the works at a fair price. Mr. Hopkins was, in general, doing everything possible for the town, but as his actions had been questioned by some he asked for the employment of another solicitor as a check upon him.

### IT WOULD NOT BE MOVED.

Reeve KYLE reported verbally, as the fire on water committee had decided not to change the location of the electric light on McD. main's hill.

### ON MOTION OF COUN. HEAD, seconded by Coun. LOVELL, a grant of \$100 was made to the Central charity committee.

### SKIPPED THE RENT.

Mayor RAY was asked if he had received the rent from the patent medicine company who had evaded the hall and skipped out. His reply was that he had instructed the market clerk to collect the rent alacety.

### OVERSTEPS HIS DUTY.

Mayor RAY said that a sum of \$25 had been paid out recently by the acting treasurer without the certificate of the street inspector. It appeared that Coun. Touchburn, chairman of the street and bridge committee, had told the treasurer he must pay it. Mayor Ray said he had not noticed the certificate, and he was personally responsible for the amount.

Coun. TOUCHBURN said the money was for the street and bridge committee, and he had been told by the treasurer that he was to pay it.

Mayor RAY said he had no objection to the payment of the money, but he was personally responsible for the amount.

### PREPARING FOR THE VOTE.

The usual by-law was introduced and carried providing for the holding of the municipal elections, and fixing the following places for nominations:—North ward, council chamber; East ward, F. Crandell's office; South ward, the cutting rink.

Following are the polling places and deputy returning officers:—

East ward, No. 1: Joseph Mauder's office; A. Bradshaw, No. 2: F. Crandell's office; A. Cullen.

North ward, No. 1: Joseph Mauder's office; O'Leary.

South ward, No. 1: council chamber; Peter Nicol, No. 2: W. Skitch's shop; R. Cornell, No. 3: Parkin's office; T. McKibbin.

### SHOWS AND CIRCUSES.

A by-law was introduced by Coun. Head amending the circus by-law by adding a new license scale. It was referred back to the committee.

### THE DEATH KNELL OF THE CURFEW.

Coun. HEAD's curfew by-law was read. It provided that boys under 14 and girls under 16 should not be permitted to loiter on the streets after 5 o'clock in winter and 9 in summer.

Coun. JOHNSTON pronounced the by-law a farce and an imposition. It would be more in order to pass a by-law keeping boys and girls over those ages off the streets.

The by-law was killed on a division on the second reading.

### AFTER THE OTHER MAN.

Coun. TOUCHBURN charged Mayor Ray with having had the Lindsay-st. sewer covered with earth at a cost of \$19 without instructions from the street and bridge committee.

The mayor said he was quite willing to have the matter investigated, and it was referred to the committee.

Council then adjourned.
