—Reports of atrocities committed by the Japanese in Port Arthur state that the foreign correspondents, horrified by the spectacle, left the army in a body.

—Henry Elias, the millionaire brewer of New York who attempted suicide on Monday by cutting his throat, died next day. His wealth was estimated at something over \$2,000,000.

—William H. Price, the well-known member of the firm of the printing press manufacturers, Chandler & Price, was almost instantly killed by a burglar at his home in Cleveland, Ohio.

—His serene highness Prince Adolphus Charles Alexander Albert Edward George Philip Louis Luitpold, and Lady Margaret Evelyn Grosvenor were married at Exton hall last week with great splendor.

—Dr. Stanley Tattersall, a veterinary surgeon, was found dead under the bed at Niagara Falls, N. Y. He evidently died in great agony, and it is supposed from the effects of poison. An inquest will be held.

—A despatch from Auckland, New Zealand, tells of the death there of Robert Louis Stevenson, the novelist. He was born in Edinburgh in 1850, and was a member of the Scotch bar. "Treasure Island" and "The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" are among his writings.

—The action of the S. W. S. government in surrendering to the Italian police the two anarchists, Zucchi and Martinetti, has caused quite a panic among the numerous Italian anarchists who have settled in the United States and some of them have already fled from that country.

—Queen Victoria has seen four czars of Russia, three emperors of Germany, two kings of Italy, several sovereigns in Spain, a king, an emperor, and several republics in France, and one Napoleon, and is still able to walk a mile today.

—Bishop Rogers of New Brunswick had a narrow escape from drowning the other day. He had gone to Newcastle, and was being rowed across the bay when the boat was struck by a large log which sent it through.

—A vibrating helmet for the cure of nervous headaches has been invented by French scientists. It is constructed of strips of steel, put in vibration by a small electric motor which makes 600 turns a minute. The sound, which is described as most unpleasant, produces drowsiness; the patient falls asleep under its influence.

—A young man, an Englishman, who was employed as valet by Sandow, the strong man, was arrested at New York as president of the "English Club." The strong man was on a telegram from the chief of police of Memphis, Tenn., who charged Chapman with the larceny of a diamond ring and a watch belonging to Sandow. Several diamond rings and pins, the property of Sandow, were found on his person.

—Count Jos de Sussini, who was once called the Napoleon of cigarette manufacturing, is now dying in his home in Nassau, Cayenne, Guiana, who is now 80 years old, was the founder of the world-famous cigarette factory "La Honradre," where he manufactured six millions of cigarettes a day and gave employment to over 5,000 persons. He introduced into Havana the first street car, the electric light, lithographic press, steam fire engine, and many other modern inventions. Although dying almost penniless, he was once worth \$1,000,000.

—A reveler, B. C. E. S. Wilson, a miner, evidently bent on suicide, jumped into the Columbia river. A large number of people gathered on the banks of the river to aid in his rescue, but all offers of assistance were refused. Mr. Wilson was seen in the water by a boatman, who was fast going down the stream, plunged into the river, but before he could reach Wilson the latter had disappeared. When then tried to make shore, but the strong current had caught him and before assistance could be reached he was drowned. Wilson had been in a demoted state of mind lately. He had previously tried to do away with himself by hanging.

—A week ago Friday last Mr. Dr. Mayor Shearman and his little grandson, while driving across the tracks of the Erie railroad, near the village of Lakewood, Ontario, were struck by a fast mail train; the child was instantly killed, and the grandfather, who was standing by the side of the car, was severely injured. He died on Wednesday.

—Two days later, his wife, who had been dismembered in the accident, was found floating in the water. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of manslaughter against the driver of the train. The driver was fined \$100 and costs.

—A young man, who was seen in the streets of New York, was arrested by a woman who was carrying a large bundle of goods. She accused him of stealing her goods. The man was taken to the police station and charged with larceny.
