

J. BERRY.

Mr. J. Berry is a manufacturer of Light and Heavy Harness, and a dealer in Trunks, Valises and Horse Supplies of all kinds. He occupies all of the fine three-story brick building, 75 x 24, at No. 100 Kent street, and has been established in business since 1855. He gives employment to two men, and does a very large trade with the people of Lindsay and the surrounding country, having a reputation for turning out only the best work and using only first-class materials. He also has a large repairing trade, the excellence of his workmanship being well known. During his long residence in Lindsay Mr. Berry has made a host of friends, not only in the town but among the farmers as well, and by all classes of the community he is held in the highest esteem.

BURKE BROS.

The firm of Burke Bros. are extensive manufacturers of Shingles, Staves, Heading, Flour Barrel Hoops and Flour Barrels, occupying two large buildings, one as a mill, the other as a cooperage and store-room, the grounds covering an area of one and a half acres. They have been established in Lindsay for the past twenty years, and now give employment to from fifteen to twenty hands. They turn out from 20,000 to 30,000 shingles, 8,000 staves, their full capacity being 18,000 staves, 16,000 heading and 10,000 hoops per day. This is in addition to an output of one hundred flour barrels per day, an amount that will shortly be increased to two hundred and fifty. They do all their own cutting for hoops, staves, heading and shingles, and have as their trade members of the firm are all natives of Canada, and have resided in Lindsay for the greater portion of their lives. As business men they are the most progressive in Canada, while as citizens they stand deservedly high in the estimation of all. They have done much towards the building up of the town.

J. RIGGS.

Mr. J. Riggs carries on a miscellaneous trade, he being a dealer in Fancy Goods, Cigars, Tobaccos, Bicycles, Toys, etc., occupying the whole of the first floor of that spacious three-story brick building at No. 6 Kent street. He has been established since 1873, and gives employment to one hand besides himself. He carries a very large stock, as indeed he must to satisfy his many customers in Lindsay, and from the towns and villages of the surrounding country. Mr. Riggs may be regarded as one of the pioneers of the town, having resided here for nearly a quarter of a century. He first came to Lindsay in 1870, and has been a constant resident ever since. During all this time he has kept on making friends, and is now one of the best known and popular men in the district. All this forest produce is brought to Lindsay, the wood going into his own yard; the logs are scid to local mill-men, and the outside parties at remunerative prices. The towing is done by Mr. Thexton's powerful little tug, the Eva, which was entirely refitted last season, and is one of the best on the lakes; he also owns a well-appointed steam pleasure yacht, the "Nona Roy," and has a summer residence on Ball Lake, near his limits. Being an old resident, Mr. Thexton is well-known, and his reputation is that of a business man of the strictest honor, while personally he enjoys the respect and confidence of all.

SYLVESTER'S IMPLEMENT AND MACHINE WORKS.

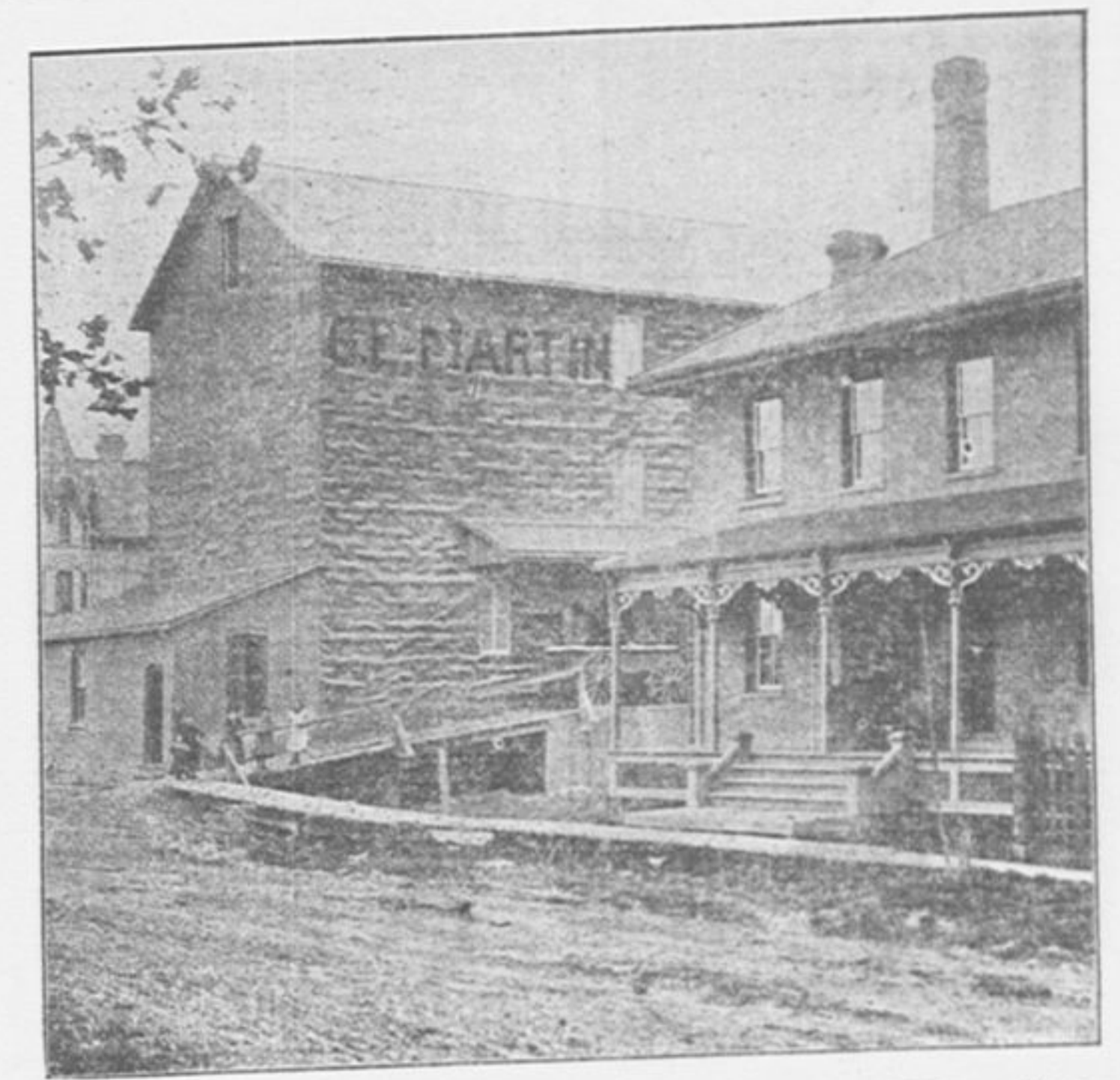

The firm make a specialty of the Sylvester Steel Binder, an implement

They also make the celebrated Monitor Press and Combined Drills, which cannot be surpassed for handiness, completeness and utility; also Spring Tooth Cultivators, Mowers, Disc Har-

rows, Plows and almost every other kind of agricultural implements. Sylvester Brothers, Messrs. Richard and Robert, are both old residents of Lindsay, and have long since demonstrated the fact that they are gentlemen of push and enterprise, who fully understand every detail of their trade. They have done a great deal towards building up the town, and command in the highest degree the respect and confidence of their fellow-citizens.

VICTORIA FLOUR MILLS.

Mr. G. E. Martin is the proprietor of the Victoria Flour Mills, which is a large three-story structure of brick and sheet iron, 91 x 30 feet in area, with a capacity of eighty-five barrels of flour per day. The leading brands turned out are "Bakers' Queen," "People's Mixed," "Standard," "Horison," "Comet," (all fall wheat), "Rainbow," Graham Flour and Corn Meal, in addition to all sorts of Meal, Feed and Chopped Stuff. The business was originally established in 1889 by Mr. I. Finley, who was succeeded in 1890 by Messrs.

Finley & Martin, Mr. G. E. Martin becoming the sole proprietor in 1892. He gives employment to nine hands, between milling and grain, and does a trade which extends all over this section of Ontario, and brings in a good deal of farmers' trade by making Lindsay a first-class grain market. The mill is run by steam, and lighted by electricity. Mr. Martin is a native of Lindsay, and has lived here all his life. He is a gentleman of decided push and marked business ability, and has done a great deal to build up the trade of the town and add to its industrial importance. He is one of the principal land owners. Personally he has a host of friends, among whom he is highly and deservedly popular.

THE LINDSAY PLANING MILL.

The Lindsay Planing Mill is the property of Mr. Geo. He also does all kinds of planing. The factory is a large two-story brick building, 77 x 45, a two-story frame building, 75 x 40, and a frame drying kiln, 40 x 20.
