County Court and General Sessions.
The county court sat on Tuesday and Wednesday last. There was but one civil case—Charles Milne vs. J. W. Howry & Sons, of Fenelon Falls. This was a case for damages for an injury received by plaintiff while working for the defendant in the mill at Fenelon Falls. The evidence went to show that the boiler in the machine was defective and out of order by reason of the protection over the shaft being tight and not properly fastened. The case lasted all day Tuesday and Wednesday. The judge's charge was strongly in favor of the plaintiff and an extra hour before adjournment was brought in a unanimous verdict for the plaintiff for \$200 damages, which is the full amount the county court can give. Mr. J. A. McDonald, of McLoughlin & McDonald, acted for the plaintiff, and Mr. W. Steers, of Barron & Steers, for the defendant.

Almost a Fatal Accident.
ABOUT 4:30 o'clock last Saturday evening, as Mr. John Hore, local agent for the Singer MTR Co., was driving down Cambridge-st. in a cutter, his spirited driver became restless and made determined attempts to run away. When he reached Matthew's packing house Mr. Hore observed a large crowd of people standing on the roadway opposite the market, and fearing that someone would be trampled upon if he drove past he turned the animal's head to the west, hoping to run him against some obstruction on the market square. Unluckily, however, the beast got beyond Mr. Hore's control, and when turned off the roadway he tore madly across the square, the cutter upsetting near the rear driveway leading to the market square. Mr. Hore was leading with terrific force against the edge of the platform, the sound of the blow being distinctly heard fifty yards away. When picked up it was found that he had sustained several frightful scalp wounds, but the full extent of his injuries could only be guessed at owing to the pressure being put on the body conveyed to Dr. Cleland's office, where the wounds were dressed, and later on in the evening he was conveyed to his home. To-day we learn that he is progressing favorably, and that he will reject many friends in town and county.
