




a tremendous slaughter of turkeys, geese and chickens was perpetrated in district to supply the demands of the British public; the table of the Englishman has been supplied with Canadian butter and cheese for some time past, and he has now developed a creditable fondness for Can-

adian fowl. For a couple of years past Messrs. Dundas & Flavelle Bros. have shipped turkeys to English provision dealers to supply the demands of the Christmas holiday trade, and while the returns were not encouraging, the dealers reported that the demand for Canadian fowl was rapidly increasing and the trade might eventually become quite profitable. Desirous of promoting the trade if it could be done without loss, the firm this fall sent out buyers to purchase 8,000 turkeys if possible, and deliveries began on Wed nesday last. The farmers of the surrounding country brought in great wagonloads of turkeys to the egg warehouse in the east ward, and thousands of birds were shipped in by train from Omemee, Bethany, Millbrook, Hastings, Beaverton, Orillia, Kirkfield, Grass Hill, Coboconk, Corson's Siding, Hallburton, Kinmount, Fenelon Falls, and other points along the different R.R. lines. All day yesterday a force of 12 or 15 men were kept busily employed sorting, weighing and packing the fowl, and a
