Inland Revenue Department on Adulteration.

JAMS AND JELLIES THE WORST

On the Whole Tradespeople Have Been Fairly Honest-Maple Syrup Found to be Mixed With Glucose-The Shoddy Blankets Scandal -

Personal and Other Notes.

Ottawa, Dec. 7 .- (Special)-The annual report of the Inland Revenue Department regarding the adulteration of food has been published and was distributed to-day. Out of 1265 samples analyzed only 105, or barely 9 per cent. of the whole have been found to be adulterated. Jams and jellies were the worst adulterated of all the samples examined. Out of 155 examined, 25 were adulterated. The attention of the department was for some years directed solely to the inspection of foods and drugs.

The area of the operations was subsequently extended to take in fertilizers and articles of commerce largely used by the farmers of the country. Later paris green was an important item, inasmuch as if not pure the agriculturist in using was frequently undeceived only by the loss of a valuable crop. The results of the past year's operations demonstrated that nearly 90 per cent. complied with the requirements of the act. A similar improvement may be noted in all classes of food excepting maple syrup, which was analyzed for the first time and has found to be in many cases adulterated with glucose. Mr. Robertson of Hamilton is in the Capital to-day to meet the Minister of Militia regarding the shoddy blan-kets scandal. The Minister states that he is determined to get to the bottom of the matter and Mr. Robertson, as an expert in the manufacture of such

goods, will assist him. A very fine specimen of blue sodality has just been placed in the Geological Museum after being polished. It was found in Hasings County by Mr. Barlow, and is the largest and most perfect specimens of this formation ever seen here.

Mr. Leferrier, secretary of the Hull School Board, wrote to-day to the British Consul of Brazil, making enquiry about his son and daughter-in-law, who left with the French-Canadian emigrants on the Moravia a few months ago. He has never received a letter and is very anxious as to their position.

The city bakers have decided to charge more for their bread, and today four-pound loaves went up one cent, making ordinary bread 11 cents and white 12 cents per loaf.

The commissioner appointed to investigate the conduct of John Crowe, Indian agent on the Sang en Reserve, Bruce County, Ontario, has made his report to the Government. Mr. Crowe is shown by evidence to have been a very active political agent, and to have relieved the Indians from paying timber dues in return f . th.i. support in the election. It is said that Mr. Crowe will be dismissed.

Mr. Lavergne, M. P., the Premier's law partner, will shortly resign from the Commons and be appointed to the Supreme Court judge hip in the Ottawa and Pontiac district, now held by Judge Malhiot, who is to be superannuated on account of failing eye-

The Emperor Cautions the Military Against Antagonizing Civilians.

Berlin, Dec. 4 .- The Hanover Anzelger says that the Emperor paid a visit last evening to the Hanover Riding School, where he addressed the young officers. His Majesty in the course of his remarks deplored the act of Lieut. Baron Von Brusewitz, who a short time ago avenged an insult by running a civilian through with his sword in a cafe at Carlsruhe, and cautioned the officers against doing anything to create antagonism between the officer corps and the civilian class. Anyhow, he said, officers would better not show any feeling of antagonism to-

wards civilians. The Lokal Anzeiger publishes a Constantinople despatch, reporting that the Emperor and Empress of Germany will visit Jerusalem on Easter Sunday, 1897, to attend to the consecration of the Evangelical Church, built on the site given to the late Emperor Frederick by the Sultan. The despatch adds that the Emperor and Empress will then proceed to Cairo at the Khedive's invitation.

CALLED THEM ALL OUT.

Hamburg Strike Extends Now to All the Workmen in the Harbor.

Hamburg, Dec. 4.-The Striks Committee has called out all of the Hamburg Harbor workmen, irrespective of the character of their employment, in order to assist the strikers. The men called out include the engineers, bargemen and others employed by the state and city. The action was taken in response to an appeal from the strikers, as the result of the meetings held yesterday. The course of the committee was approved by a meeting of the workers, held subsequent to the issuance of the order calling the men out. At Antwerp.

Antwerp, Dec. 4.-The dock laborers at this port are refusing to unload vessels coming from Hamburg and a general strike of dockmen is imminent.

Daring Horsemen Manage to Keep Weyler's Troops Busy and Terrify the People of Havana.

New York, Dec. 5 .- Among the passengers on the steamship Vigilance, which arrived yesterday from Havana, was a young American who has been engaged in business in Havana for several years. Just before the steamer sailed, he says, rumors were spread about the city to the effect that the insurgents were displaying unusual activity in the provinces of Pinar Del Rio and Santa Clara. A body of daring horsemen dashed up within six miles of Havana, burned a plantation and escaped before the squadron of cavalry sent out to meet them got to the scene. Such incidents are alarmingly frequent. They produce the double effect of demoralizing the Spanish soldiery and shaking the belief of residents of the city in the ability of Weyler to keep the insurgents away from Havana. Outwardly the city is quiet, but under the surface there is much disappointment at the mismanagement of the Spaniards in both military and civil departments. A third of the inhabitants are friends of the revolution and many others sympathize with it. The rest are with the Spanish. Gomez is now investing the town of Santa Clara. He has shut off the garrison from all communication with the outside world, and unless the relief comes soon the town will surely fall into his hands. His cavalry has been particularly active in cutting off foraging parties. The hopes of the patriots in Havana have been greatly heightened by these exploits. They think it is only a question of time when Gomez will be under the walls of Havana itself. The Americans in Havana believe that if Gomez and Maceo hold out until President-Elect McKinley is inaugurated and the new Congress is in session, when American intervention is expected, they will win.

Young Howell Had Become Mentally Weak and the Girl's Parents Had the Engagement Broken Off-The Girl's

Wound Is Very Serious, But

She May Recover. Montreal, Dec. 6 .- (Special.) -- John Howell shot Annie Sims this morning at her home, and then emptied his 38-calibre revolver into his own brain, dropping dead instantly. Three or four years ago Howell, who is about 27 years of age, became engaged to Miss Sims, aged 23, daughter of James Sims, postoffice clerk, and living at 234 St. Martin-street, or about three doors from the residence of her lover's father. Two years ago the young man contracted matarial fever in New Mexico, and his mind has been so considerably weakened since I had to be very guarded as to what I ate, that the young lady's family strongly obtherwise I paid the penalty. It is believed that Howell came to Montreal on purpose to kill Miss Sims. She was a lady much esteemed and an active Sunday School worker in the First Baptist
