COUNTY ROADS.

roads question. It does not need much argument or illustration just now to convince a farmer drawing a heavy load of grain to market that first-class leading roads would be an immense advantage. We are satisfied that many good men have during the past three weeks seriously impaired their standing as church members when they have to struggle through mud-holes innumerable to market. We don't blame them for using strong language, though it may be illogical and inconsequential. But they will be open to reproof and admonition if they do not heartily support the movement for go roads that has started in the county council. We feel so much interest in this practical question that we again place before our readers the clause in the report of the county council committee on roads, because it makes an important

Your committee have considered the resolution council instructing them to report on the advisability of the council assuming and maintaining certain record of judicious enterprise and careful leading roads in the county. The mover and seconder of the resolution have supported it before your committee, on the principle of county control of leading highways, with much force and clearness. If is apparent that under the present system of local municipal control there is great inequality in the condition of the roads; that most of the work of construction is temporary in its character; that there is no community of interest between the municipalities, and that the system is extravagant and inefficient, and, therefore, unsatisfactory. urged that when leading roads are spoken of it does not necessarily mean roads leading to the county town inconsistency never deters them from only as a centre.
