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AT COTEAU DU LAC, Q.

Riot Among Laborers on the Soulanges Canal.

Alexio Greico, an Italian, Killed, and Several of His Co-Nationals Badly Wounded-The Italians Up His Arms over the Way They Have Been Treated-Two Arrests.

Montreal, Dec. 9.-A serious riot broke out last night between the French-Canadian and Italian laborers employed on the Soulanges Canal at Coteau du Lac, about 85 miles from Montreal. Alexio Greico, an Italian, was killed and several were badly injured. The Italians are up in arms and threatening trouble. Police have been sent from Montreal to the scene, and several arrests have been made.

Two Frenchmen Arrested.

Coteau du Lac, Que., Dec. 9.-A horrible murder took place here last night, when an Italian named Alexio Greico lost his life. There was a little fight yesterday at 8 o'clock, and the quarrel was resumed last night about 6 o'clock.

Two French-Canadians have been arrested. The coroner and detective are coming out. The Italians are very much excited, and there are about 100 patrolling the streets of the town in search of the alleged murderers. The people are much alarmed and fear further trouble. At 10 o'clock the Italians appeared to be calmed down a little, but are still in search of the murderers. In groups of five and ten, and threaten to kill them on sight.
