# DOVER CASTLE IN FLAMES.

The Great Power Takes Quiet Dover, England, Dec. 15 .- Fire broke out in the Castle here yesterday morning, soon gutted the officers' quarters and extended to the main block. The whole garrison was ordered out to fight the flames, and the magazine was threatened. The outbreak is supposed to have been due to an overheated chimney. There was ] some difficulty at first in getting water, and this caused great excitement, but the entire garrison was utilized in passing buckets from hand to hand to fill the tanks, and the supply thus obtained proved sufficient.

Owing to the exertions of the garrison in removing the valuables, the property damage was comparatively small, and very much less than was at first expected. | 25c. Dover Castle is on the cliffs above Dover, and is more like a fortress than any of the other defences in England. Julius Caesar is credited with building the foundations and part of the fortress, although recent antiquarians assert it was built between the years A.D. 43 and 49, during the reign of Claudius. The Saxon portion of the fortress is presumed to have been commenced by Alfred the Great, and the foundation of the present keep is said to have originated with Gundulph, Bishop of Rochester, about the year 1153. The barracks accommodate about 2,000 men.
