THE GREATER NEW YORK.

RUSSIA IN THE EAST.

The Great Power Takes Quiet Possession of Port Arthur.

CHINA DID NOT RAISE A PROTEST

The Czar's Navy Simply Needed a Winter Station in the East—No Demonstrations Intended Against Germany, Japan or Any Other Power—Sir Frank Lockwood Dead—Cable News.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 20.—It is announced that a Russian squadron under Rear Admiral Ronouov has entered Port Arthur, on the Chinese coast, with the entire acquiescence of the Chinese Government. The squadron intends to remain at Port Arthur throughout the winter. This is due solely to the need of a temporary winter station and involves no question of forcible occupation or any demonstration, or any intention against China, Germany, Japan or any other power.

Various Ideas About It.

London, Dec. 20.—The correspondent of the Times at Peking says: "China approves of the Russian fleet wintering at Port Arthur, being persuaded that this action is taken in the interest of China and necessitated by the German occupation of Kiao-Chow."

A despatch to the Times from Shanghai says the occupation of Port Arthur (or Kiao-chow) cannot fail to provoke popular indignation in Japan, where public opinion is already excited over the Kiao-Chow affair.

According to a despatch to the Daily Mail from Shanghai, the high officials of the Chinese Court have advised the Emperor, in view of the further complications, to remove the court to Nanking (the "southern capital"). The despatch says the Emperor is reported to have been made to England to exercise protection over the Yang-Tse Valley and the West River, and that numerous rumors are current regarding the activity of the British squadron in Chinese waters.

Telegrams from all the continental capitals show that the news of the Russian fleet's occupation of Port Arthur is regarded as tantamount to a permanent occupation and a reply to Germany's action.

The Novoe Vremya pretends that Japan has no cause for complaint, since China is only giving the same shelter to Russian ships as Japan had hitherto so kindly afforded. This view is not held in Berlin, where the papers are already taking of the possibility of Prince Henry having to shake his mailed fist at Japan. That is supposed to be secretly looked up by England. Some of the Berlin papers express anxiety, but most of them welcome the news from Port Arthur as justifying the German position at Kiao-Chow, if not as actual evidence that Russia and Germany are acting together. Curiously enough, Emperor William visited the Russian Ambassador on Friday night on his return from Kiel, ostensibly to congratulate him on the name day of Emperor Nicholas. The visit lasted an hour. There is no doubt that the Emperor and the Ambassador discussed Chinese affairs.

The Paris papers, without pretending to be deceived by Russia's innocent explanations, are pleased with the action of the ally of France.

The hundreds of German comment is, "What will England do?"

The British fleet now in Chinese waters consists of one ironclad, nine cruisers and 18 smaller vessels.

The Times, commenting editorially this morning on the situation in China, says: "Instead of the Kaiser's mailed fist, we have Russia's velvet glove, but the grasp is not less vigorous and unyielding. Great Britain ought not to courtous to China to extend the same privilege to the British fleet at Chusan."

A RICH NAVY.

Leaves Wife and Wealth to Toll With Laborers Because of His Ideas of Advanced Civilization.

New York, Dec. 16.—Declining an offer of almost unlimited wealth if he would return to his wife and former mode of living, George W. Budy, son of a millionaire brick manufacturer of Woodbridge, N.J., and a student of Tolstoy and other leading advocates of advanced civilization, is living among the poorest residents of his native town, and is daily driving a sprinkling cart past his father's estate. For this alienation, the application for divorce made by his wife, Mrs. Amelia Budy, a talented daughter of a wealthy merchant, was to-day favorably passed upon by Senator Voorhees.

Young Budy is a graduate of Yale, and of two foreign universities, and is a proficient linguist. He offers no explanation, beyond declaring that he wishes to live his own life. His marriage was a love match, and, while refusing his wife's pleas to return to her, praises her unflinchingly as a beautiful and accomplished woman. His friends say that he has become permeated with the idea that wealth is a horrible wrong, and that a man, to live a true life must pass his days among the toilers and share their sorrows and joys.

DOVER CASTLE IN FLAMES.

One of the Historic Fortresses of Old England Almost Destroyed by a Fierce Fire.

Dover, England, Dec. 15.—Fire broke out in the Castle here yesterday morning, soon gutted the officers' quarters and extended to the main block. The whole garrison was ordered out to fight the flames, and the magazine was threatened. The eastern portion of the Castle was completely gutted, and the flames spread to the western portion, but were under control at 4 p. m.

The outbreak is supposed to have been due to an overheated chimney. There was some difficulty at first in getting water, and this caused great excitement, but the entire garrison was utilized in passing buckets from hand to hand to fill the tanks, and the supply thus obtained proved sufficient.

Owing to the exertions of the garrison in removing the valuables, the property damage was comparatively small, and very much less than was at first expected.

The tools and machinery were swept along the track of the current, bridges and considerable sidewalk were washed away. About 500 cords of wood belonging to Squire Bros. and Finlay & Son, is spread along the banks of the stream for some miles. Other buildings were flooded, but not much damaged.

FRED ELLIOTT'S FATE

Is Now in the Hands of the Jury at Goderich.

Goderich, Ont., Dec. 16.—The trial of Fred Elliott for shooting his brother at Bayfield on Nov. 8 commenced before Judge Masson yesterday morning. The evidence produced so far is practically the same as that given at the coroner's inquest.

At the conclusion of the examination of Miss Elliott, Mr. Proudfoot, for the defendant, addressed the jury for three-quarters of an hour, and was followed by Mr. Lewis, the prosecutor.

His Honor Judge Masson then charged the jury and they retired at 8:30 p. m., and will likely not give their verdict before this morning.

SIX BURNED TO DEATH.

Patrick Leahy of Ottawa and His Five Young Children Cremated in Their Burning Home.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 18.—One of the most heartrending catastrophes that ever visited Ottawa took place yesterday morning at 101 St. Patrick street. Clarence, five, caused the death of Patrick T. Leahy and his five young children, Thomas, aged 8, Mamie, 7, Katie, 6, Maggie, 4, and Patrick, 2. Frank, aged 5, was saved. The fire broke out at 10, and in spite of a prompt response from the reels and hose wagon, it was evident that the house was doomed. It was not, however, until the arrival of Chief Provost that it was learned the family, the best part of them, were in the doomed building. The chief at once ordered the door burst open and himself made a rush into the house.

A terrible scene met his gaze. The stairway was burned down, and lying at the foot was the body of an apparently ten-year-old girl, turned to a crisp. Mrs. Leahy tried to quench the fire, exhausting her efforts in this direction and had barely time to escape from the house with one child.

Story of an Eye-Witness.

The account as told by Joseph Boulez, who rescued Mrs. Leahy and her child from the kitchen floor of the burning building, is as follows:—

Mr. Boulez lives in the house opposite, and shortly after 3 o'clock was awakened by a woman's screams. Getting up he saw that Mr. Leahy's house was on fire. On reaching the fire a few other men were there. He obtained a ladder and saved Mrs. Leahy from the best part of the kitchen, and carried her to the street. She was taken to the hospital. Mrs. Leahy told him that she knew about the fire. She said she had been awakened by Mr. Leahy, who told her she was getting daylight and that she should get up at once. She did so, and, seeing the house full of smoke and the light of the fire, at once took to the stairway. She could not descend by the stairway, and with one child, climbed over the roof of the kitchen. Her screams also awakened Mrs. Clark and Mr. Anderson, living at 67 Priest street. Mr. Anderson tried to enter the burning house by way of the kitchen, but the fire was so severe in the front part that he was unable to do so, and devoted his energies to saving his own house.

A Horrible Suspicion.

The suspicion entertained by some, that Leahy stole the key of the fire alarm box and set the house on fire while temporarily out of his mind, was greatly strengthened later on in the day, when the startling discovery was made that the keyhole of the box had been plugged with a small stone. Even had the key been found it would have been impossible under the circumstances to open the lock.
