

MISCELLANEOUS.

A NECESSITY IN TRADE.—Nothing appears to us more irrational and unseemly than tedious chaffering in trade, yet business men generally encourage the practice. For example, no merchant seems to think of asking the price he means to take for an article; and, of course, customers thus educated, never think of giving the price that is asked. The consequence is that every sale is a contest of rival wits, a laborious and disagreeable struggle of cunning against decency and self-respect are outraged.
