## TORONTO CORRESPONDENCE.

(From our own Correspondent.) "L'audace; toujours l'audace." There are many people who have as much faith in audacity as Danton. Some of the men who undertake to direct the service of the City of Toronto and administer its affairs are certainly not destitute of that virtue, if virtue it is. An audacious scheme has been set on foot, characterised by the usual amount of impudence, having for its object the enactment of bye-laws which will make the Mayoraly and Aldermanship tri-yearly offices; also to pension off persons who have spent a part of their lives in the service of the city, and other projects more or less beneficial to the clique who pull the strings. A petition to counteract these arbitrary and ill-judged measures is in course of circulation among the citizens, and we trust that this embryotic ring will be nipped in the bud, and further developments arrested by the voice of the people. Alderman Manning has been elected Mayor by the Council. We believe that Manning would not stand the ghost of a chance if the election of Mayor was left to the choice of the people. The great bulk of the citizem have no faith in him, and where his own interests come into contact with the public interests, he invariably chooses that course which is most beneficial to his own pocket. It is often a matter of astonishment that an intelligent population will allow themselves to be misled and their confidence abused by persons who allow themselves to be controlled by other influences than those that are entirely friendly to the public weal. Yet such is very often the fact. Indifferentism is andoubtedly to blame to a great extent, and the rest is due to unremitting devotion to the toils of business or manual work. In regard to pensioning off servants of the corporation, we fail to see what claim a person has upon a situation that he is free to quit the moment he can command a better, or when it becomes disagreeable to him.
