

CORRESPONDENCE.
 Editor of THE EXPOSITOR.
 DEAR SIR,—I notice the intimation given in your last issue, that I have been remiss in the matter of sending you Parliamentary papers, and feel gratified at having been afforded an opportunity of accounting for what may very properly have appeared to you, and perhaps to other members of the fourth estate in the Riding, a lack of courtesy or neglect of duty.

The fact is, I have taken it for granted that all Parliamentary papers were sent direct from the routine office to the newspaper offices throughout the Province, and if there are exceptions to this rule, I am under the impression that they are owing to neglect on the part of publishers to have their papers placed upon the list. If I had not supposed what I have stated above to be the case, I should certainly have considered that the Press had the first claim upon my allowance, and if there is any other Editor in the Riding who has felt with you that he is not indebted to his local representative in the premises, I trust that this explanation will be considered a sufficient apology for an unintentional omission.

I may add, in reference to this matter, that the bills and papers of all kinds received by each member during a Session go but a very short way indeed in supplying such a constituency as this, containing about 5,000 electors, so that I have to confine myself in a great measure to official papers, and a few hundred others whose post office address I may happen to know, when sending out such documents as are likely to be of general or local interest to readers in the Riding.

If I had duplicated the supply sent as I supposed to newspaper offices, I have been lessening the means of giving information to others of what was being done in the House, merely with a view to elicit an editorial acknowledgment. The fact is, I felt greatly relieved at being, as I thought, relieved from one item of duty, as, during the present Session especially, I find it very difficult to do all that is required of me in connection with land and other departmental matters, and the very large correspondence arising therefrom, caused in a great measure by the late re-valuation of Crown Lands throughout the Riding.

I shall be happy, however, at all times, to attend to the wants of the Press, whenever I am advised of any requirement, and so far as I may be able to do so.
