> DEATH FROM STARVATION .- It will surprise our readers to learn that such a thing as death from want is possible amongst us. Yet we are assured that this was the real cause of the death of W. H. Leatherley, who died while on his way to his shanty in North Orillia last Sunday. The deceased was employed on the Midland Railway, and not having received his pay, whether over due is not stated, was reduced to want. He told no one of his circumstances, but struggled on until he died, as already stated, from apoplexy and exhaustion, induced by want of nourishment. There is said to be a large amount of destitution amongst the Rail way labourers, who have been working on the Midland Railway, both in this neighbourhood and at Coldwater, in consequence of the partial suspension of the work and the navvies having been left to shift for themselves, without provision for the winter. These people should not be left in want, and the Railway Company or contractors do not perform their duty in relieving them, a public meeting should be held without delay, to take steps for affording relief which will reach all who are really diserving, and to express in-
