

A Councillor's Confession.

Mr. EATON.—We cannot think that Councillor Bailey's statements, which appeared in the Packet of the 4th instant, are very satisfactory to his companions in power. It is an old saying that when things fall out the honest man comes to his own. So we think that the promoters of morality and temperance in Orillia have now a prospect (although it may be in the distance) of the triumph of those principles which are sacred to every upright and honest man. There is nothing called to lower a man more than to reveal secrets, especially when it is with the object of screening himself and hitching up in the shoulders of others, whom he knows are as deep in the mud as he is in the mire, his shortcomings. This has been the case with our friend John, in trying to get out an explanation in connection of himself with regard to the course he pursued, with others, in granting licenses to Mick, &c. Here is our friend's statement:—I voted for Mick's license, "because it was notorious that he had been selling without license for months, and there seemed to be no means of preventing it." And it is possible that such has been the case in the very Village of Orillia, with a Council composed of five, supposed to be the brightest and most far-seeing men in the community? So says John. Sad and lamentable it is to hear our wise men of the north make such humble confessions of weakness, and then whine and cry and ask the people to deal mercifully toward them. Let me put a question to our friend John, who is now closing up his second year, sitting at the feet of one of the wisest and most efficient Councillors in the County, who is capable of instructing in the principles of Village Government. Does John know the extent of power invested in a Council or Corporation of either Village, Town or City? Does he not know that all governing bodies corporate are invested with all the powers of the nation to which they belong, while acting within the prescribed law by which they are governed, whether that body be village, town, city or county, and the nation is bound in honor to expend its last dollar in defence of the lawful acts of such bodies. This being the case, why the cry of weakness in Orillia Council, that even a violator of the laws of the land should carry on under the very nose of the corporation, and, according to the Councillor's statement, to their knowledge, his work of destruction and death, to shrink responsibility and to clear their own skirts, they take him under their wing of protection, and enroll him among those over whom they can have a general oversight. As this matter has leaked out, and this weakness been confessed, it is our privilege to weigh it in the scale to know whether it is found wanting or not. First, why such weakness? Was not the corporation vested with power? If so, then why not exercise it, and why was not this transgressor brought to justice, and meted just punishment? The Councillor says they as true men were either could not or would not deal with this case. If they could not, then why hold the position they do, and continue to blindfold the people, and if they would not, have their heads, like stripes, the Council have their heads, and said, "Mr. Dairy, we will take you under our wing." 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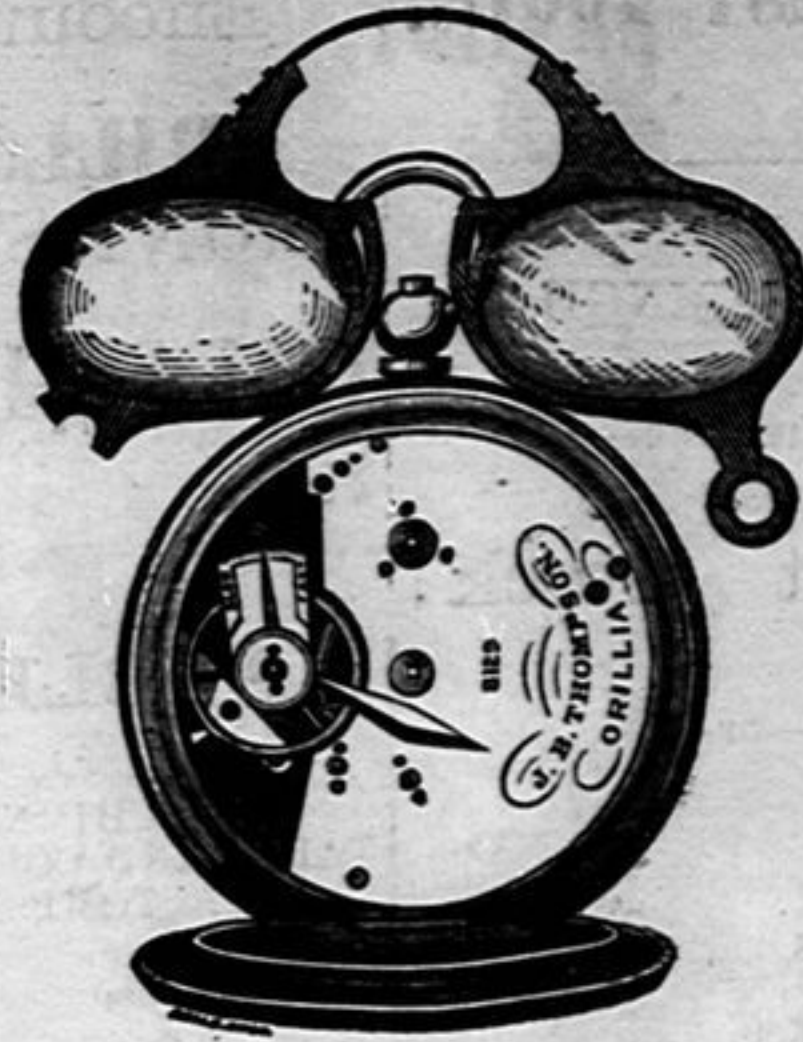
