A summons to surrender being disregarded, fire was opened on place and a quarter of an hour's bombardment sufficed to set the negro huts on fire and drive out the enemy. While this bombardment was going on the Ashantees were seen advancing in force to the relief of their friends, whereupon Col. Festing at once faced about and routed them, with a loss of twenty men, the British losing one man killed and T. F. ELLIS & Co., officers and 490 men. The marines had hardly returned to their ships, and the military to their quarters at the Castle, before the Ashantees, to the number of 3,000, again advanced. quite bravely, and again the British forces, numbering this time 15 officers and 318 men, turned out to meet them. No odds in their favor could avail the Ashantees, who had only flint lock muskets, against the deadly precision and rapid firing of the Snider Rifles, with which the British, DRY GOODS, both marines and native auxiliaries, were armed; and after a short and sharp conflict they fled in confusion, leaving 200 dead on the field, while the British again lost one man killed and three wounded, making a total loss to them in the two fights of two men killed and six wounded. It would appear that it is intended to give the Ashantees a lesson that

will secure better behavior on their part for the future. We see it stated that the troopship Simoom, left Portsmouth, July 17th, with several detachments of troops for the West Coast of Africa for "active service," and having on board a number of mountain howitzers, something after the pattern of those used in the Abyssinian campaign, but of rather a lighter description. The next day the British and African Steam Navigation Company's Royal Mail Steamer Congo sailed from the Mersey for the West Coast of Africa, and carried out a large quantity of war material, and military stores and supplies for End Cope Coast Castle, and the chances were that the Congo would reach Cape Coast Castle before the Simoom. We would strongly invite intending There is not the least doubt that a very small British force could chastise the Ashantees most effectually, owing to the inferior arms in the hands of the latter, but this warlike tribe has a terribly ally in the shape of the deadly African malaria, that has proved disastrous to a previous expedition. The British troops in the above conflicts had quinine dealt | SECURE THEIR WANTS! out to them before setting forth on the march, and had to hurry back to their ships and quarters to escape the malarious influences. The Ashantees seem to be full of fighting yet, as it is reported that after their defeats they held a palaver and determined to attack Cane Coast Castle. It is hoped that this war may have a result beneficial to the interests of African civilization, and that the Ashantees may be brought so far to submission as to be compelled to abandon the cruel and barbarous customs which prevail among them. -Montreal Witness


