**Not an Inapt Simile.**  
A correspondent of the New York Herald, now in Montreal, furnishes some interesting facts to the readers of that journal, concerning the position of Canada and our efforts to build up a nationality north of the Republic which will prove a formidable competitor to that go-ahead community. To give a pointed illustration of what he conceives by actual observation to be the relative positions of the two countries at the moment, he cites the old fable of the hare and the tortoise, showing that while the self-confident hare fell asleep in the race, the steady plodding tortoise leisurely touched the goal. Such an idea, he admits, never forced itself upon him until the Dominion of Canada, and lest there might be any mistake in the application of it he assures the readers of the Herald that he finds "no such evidences of rapid progress in Canada as would justify an attempt to cast it in the 'role of the hare.' What he finds is that there is 'no rush, no hurry' to get somewhere else before anybody else on the part of the Kanuck people; yet they are quietly taking 'very long strides up the pathway' of empire, and they may one of these days earn for their country 'a better reputation than that of being merely the great refrigerator for the family of nations.' And this is not the only surprise which a visit to the Dominion has brought to the correspondent. He has evidently had his eyes opened to the fact that all the bounties of nature have not been expended upon the Republic.

**EXTRAORDINARY HIGHLAND SUPERSTITION.**—During the fortnight recently the people of Skye were busily engaged stacking their peats and securing their winter firing, but in the two weeks following no real Skye man would stack his peat for any consideration because the moon was crescent. Skye men never stack their peats but when the moon is waning. They believe that if peats were stacked when the moon is crescent they should give neither light nor heat when burned; a power of smoke would be all that could be expected from peats stacked under a crescent moon. In some parts of the Highlands the people won't kill any sheep, cow, or pig, for meat, but when the moon is crescent, believing that if they made meat when the moon was on the wane it would be good for nothing but "erionnadh" (shrinking) in the pot; and there are thousands of such moonish superstitions believed in by the Highlanders, but we believe that of the Skye men with regard to their peats to be the most extraordinary of the whole.

**GETTING READY TO BE HAPPY.**—This is exactly what most of us are doing. We are not ready to be happy to-day, this week, this year; but to-morrow, next month, another year, our cup of joy will be full. When the promised time comes, the acme of our hopes in a certain direction is reached, health may be wanting, friends dead, and life however full of all we thought would make it rich and worth having, be empty and dreary. "What a very inquisitive person you are!" said his Excellency, pulling up the window.

A WOMAN named Underwood, aged forty, only two weeks from England, died suddenly at Ottawa, on Thursday. The coroner's jury returned a verdict "That the deceased came to her death from shameful neglect."  
MESSRS. R. M. WANDER & Co., of Hamilton have shipped a number of their celebrated sewing machines, in charge of a general agent who goes to establish the business of the firm permanently in that distant country. Too much credit cannot be given Mr. Wander as a pioneer in the enterprise of finding foreign markets for Canadian manufactures.

THE Quebec Grand Lodge of the Sons of Temperance adopted the following clause of the report of a committee:—On the subject of Prohibitory Legislation we need scarcely repeat the sentiment of former sessions of this body. We deem political action whenever and wherever practicable, on the great drink curse, a duty incumbent on every member of our Order.  
A MAN giving his name as Wm. Hender son was arrested at Ottawa on Friday, for cruelly ill-treating his wife and killing his child by lying on it. He is an habitual drunkard. Mrs. Henderson was confined on Wednesday, and on Thursday night her husband coming home drunk about one o'clock, abused her, and then lay down in bed on the infant, which died soon afterwards.

A COUPLE of Scotchmen started from St. Catharines to the lake shore last Thursday, with a horse and buggy, for the purpose of taking a bath. They deposited their clothes in the buggy, and while in the water the horse walked off with the clothes and buggy, and did not stop until he arrived at a tavern at the Four Mile creek. Fortunately a farmer saw the horse, and surmising what was the matter, brought back the quadruped and clothing. The bathers did not get home until ten o'clock at night.  
THE cheese crop of the present season is likely to prove a very fair one, both in regard to quality and quantity. A considerable number of new factories have been built in Canada this season, the cheese business prices will to some extent, swell the aggregate of the present crop, but if the quality is all right it will not disturb the market. If the quality of our goods can be kept up a liberal export trade will be likely to continue. There is no danger of clogging the market with good cheese. Good quality increases demand by increasing consumption, and demand sustains prices. It is the poor stuff that blocks up trade, depresses prices by stopping consumption. So far there has been less complaint of poor cheese this year than usual.
