DASTARDLY OUTRAGE,

A spirit of ruffianism is becoming sorampant in Orillia that rowdies presume more and more upon public indifference, and venture to repeat acts of increasing villiany and characterized by audacity that a few years ago could not have been attempted with impunity. Yesterday morning the fronts of several stores in town were covered with blood and slaughter-house refuse. The marble yard of C. Davies & Co., who are laboring to establise a branch of industry which promises to be of much benefit to the town, was entered, about \$40 worth of stone broken, and the filth scoundrels did not get into the work-shop, which would doubtless have also been deof the store of A. Kennedy & Co. was left in a horrible state; the office of T. Dalwere but little better. The glass in the door of Wilson's Larder was broken, and the whole place, inside and out, be-spattered with blood, from which an intolerable stench was emitted. Our authorities should offer a large reward for the conviction of the perpetrators of this outrage, and in the event of a repetition of such proceedings, the Council should not wait the town incorporation before employing an efficient constable, at a fair salary, and who will have no business or other interests to interfere with the discharge of his public duties. The ratepayers will not demur to the outlay.
