Temperance at Rugby and Hawkstone

DEAR EXPOSITOR, - Knowing your temperance principles, and that you are always willing to publish anything that will advance the cause of Temperance in this neighbourhood, I am sure you will be pleased to know that the Rugby and Hawkstone Temperance Societies, and that we have been trying to establish a new Division at Hawkstone. The members of Rugby Division to the number of twenty-two, among whom were several of the fair sisters, left their Division room on Thursday evening, the 23rd August, for Hawkstone, and after a pleasant drive, arrived at that village about seven o'clock. Here they expected to have met some of the Orillia brethren, but these did not put in an appearance. Although the meeting had been duly advertised, things for a time seemed rather gloomy, there being no appearance of anyone near the school-house, where the meeting was to be held. However, the Rugby people, nothing daunted, set to work to hunt up the key, and with success, for they found an old tried son of Temperance in Mr. Spink, the worthy miller at Hawkstone, who soon put the house in order, providing lights, etc. The Hawkstone school-house has a bell-tatched and after giving this a pull, a few of the people of the village put in an appearance. The meeting was called to order by Bro. James Ball, W. P. of Rugby, who filled the chair very efficiently. Bro. E. D. Sidons, of the Rugby Congregational Church, opened the meeting with prayer, and subsequently made a very able speech, stating some of the benefits arising from Temperance Societies, and urged those present to try to form a Division at Hawkstone. Bro. T. M. Edmondson, D. G. W. P., Rugby, in a fluent and telling speech, pointed out the evils arising from drinking customs, and advantages that accrue to the community from a temperance Society. He also stated that he thought there was enough material present to lay the foundation for a good Division. Messrs. Spink, Morrison, Holliday and Williamson also spoke in favour of forming a Division. After an hour or two of pleasant sport in talking upon the subject, six or seven gentlemen gave in their names and pledged themselves to do their utmost to form a Division, which is said to be very much needed at Hawkstone. It is intended to hold another public meeting at Hawkstone at no distant day, and I have no doubt but we will soon see a flourishing Division there. I wish them every success. At the last meeting of Rugby Division, they initiated five new members into their Order, among whom were the two leading men of the place, the preacher and the dominie. Not so bad for Rugby. R.M.K.
