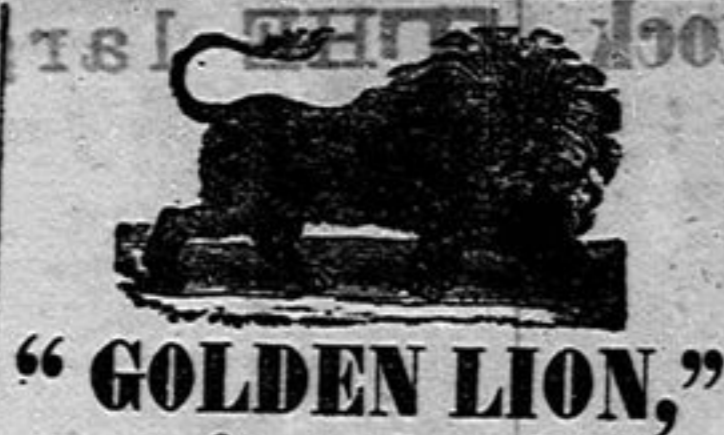

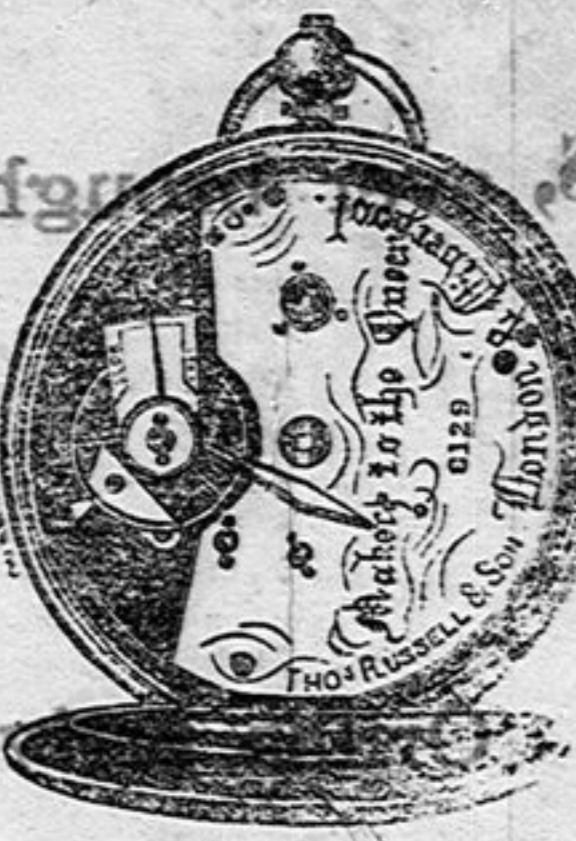

From the time that father Wood, the English Monk, constructed the first piano to the present day, that instrument has become more and more popular, until it is hardly possible to enter a well-to-do family without meeting with this instrument. What used to be the privilege of the few has by the reduction of price become the possession of the many. Until lately all the pianos in use in the country were imported, but we are pleased to state that we have now several piano manufactories. Recently we visited the establishment of Messrs. Heintzman & Co., 115 and 117 King street west, where from the spinning of the wire to the turning out of the perfect instrument, all the work is done on the premises. In the basement is the spinning machine, and here the very best imported English steel is manufactured into the strings of the piano. On the first floor are the offices and the show rooms, handsomely fitted up. On the second floor there is another large show room where every piano manufactured by the firm can be examined previous to purchase. On the third floor their key makers, sounding board, and fly finishing work shops. The ivory and veneer are imported, and the delicate keys are made in the first of these shops. In the second, the sounding boards are made from well seasoned wood; and in the third the fly-finishing or one of the many processes of finishing the case is done. On the fourth floor are the finishing and varnish rooms. In the first of these the parts of the piano are put together and the instrument is then lowered to another flat, where it is tuned and tested. In the varnishing room can be seen row after row of cases in various stages of polishing, the entire process covering the period of some months.
