Singular Certificates of Character.

The Certificates are the production of the
Rev. Wm. Leslie, for about half a century,
minister of the Parish of St. Andrews,
Lhanbryde, Scotland. The former, copied
from Dunbar's "Social Life in former days,"
appeared some time ago in the Scottish
American Journal; the latter has only re-
cently been published. Mr. Leslie was a
person noted for humour, and kindness to
the poor.

"To all his Majesty's loving subjects
who can feel for a fellow-sinner in distress,
I beg to certify that the bearer, W. Jack,
is the son of my old bellman, a man well
known in this neighbourhood for his honest
poverty and excessive drink, and the son
has inherited a full share of the father's
poverty and a double portion of his indolence.
I cannot say that the bearer has many
more active virtues to boast of; but he is
not altogether unmindful of scriptural in-
junctions, having striving, with no small
success, to 'replenish the earth,' though
he has done but little to subdue the same.
It was his misfortune to lose his cow lately,
from too little care and too much care,
chaff; and that walking skeleton, which
he calls his 'horse,' having ceased to 'hear
the oppressor's voice, or dread the tyrant's
rod,' the poor man has no means of rid-
ing his loss but the skins of the defunct
and the generosity of a benevolent public,
whom he expects to be stimulated to greater
liberality by this testimonial from—thine,

"To whom this may or may not con-
cern—It is hereby certified that, in my
estimation, Jane Simpson is a very good
clever, and honest lass, meeting the favor-
able regards and protection of any of the
elect among whom Providence may ap-
point her lot—the cause of this very esti-
mation of her being that she is often rather
a casual inmate for several days, and occa-
sionally for week's together at a time, than
a personal resident; and although she
never had the means of stealing £20 from
me, as such an amount is very rarely al-
lowed scarcely to light with me, yet I have
often seen clothes belonging to each and all
of the family, servants' chests left open,
and silver spoons left carelessly on the
cheer dresser and other laid up, with
other little matters tempting to any one of
dishonest habits, entirely in her power
she has been thievishly inclined. But I know
that nothing has been missed by any of the
servants or others at any time since she
began to be serviceable among us. Given
by me at Lhanbryde Manse, the 4th Decem-
ber, 1826."

Burning of the Steamer "Saverton."

THE PURSER'S STATEMENT.
"it was not blowing hard at the
time. The other two boats reached land
in safety about one o'clock on Monday
morning. There was very little screaming or any-
thing of that sort, but when we were leav-
ing the steamer I heard something like
moaning. Some one said that they saw
two women standing on her stern. The
last I saw of Captain Carmichael he was in
the water holding on to a plank. He
called out 'Charley, Charley, Charley,'
him; a boy who was near him then got hold
of the boat, and while we were pull-
ing him in the captain seemed to paddle
away from us, and we lost him. Some
one said that he had a pistol, but
it is not likely he lived long, the water
was so cold. A tug was towing the hull
of the steamer into Whitty this morning
when I left. She had on board about 50 tons
of bacon, and a small quantity of other freight
when she was burned." The *Saverton* was
the old steamer Kingston rebuilt. The
Kingston, it will be recollected, was burned
in the St. Lawrence a year ago last June,
and her hull being of iron it was used in
the construction of the *Saverton*. The
steamer was put on the lake as a tug, and
on the 1st of July last. She was a very
fine boat, valued at about \$60,000. She
was insured against fire to the amount of
\$40,000 or 45,000. The hull of the
Saverton, which is of iron, has been towed
into Whitty. The fire has been got under,
but the smoke and heat prevents a search.
No bodies have yet been recovered. The
cause of the fire is not known, and various
theories are propounded, but it seems to
have taken from the furnace, and before
it was discovered had enveloped the
whole centre of the vessel. A thorough
investigation is necessary, both into the
origin of the fire and the conduct of the
crew who escaped. The pilot's boat could
have held three times the number it had
on it and why the other boat made no at-
tempt to save the *Saverton*, although it
grazed the plank he was floating on, is in-
explicable. There seems to have been a
terrible lack of discipline and no attempt
to stay by the steamer to pick up any who
might have jumped overboard. There are
conflicting accounts respecting the lady
passengers. It is said they were seen on
the bow shrieking for help, but the purser,
who was on the mate's boat, declared he
heard no shrieks or screams, but it is evi-
dent they were seen in the boat by the
stewardess, who was the only other woman
on board, but she was below and escaped
her night dress in the pilot's boat.
All those saved were taken east by the
Circassian.
