The quantity of pig iron and crude steel produced in Canada in 1895 far exceeded that of any other year. It amounted to 62,863 tons. Yet the price was lower up almost to the middle of the year than it had ever been before, and the pressure of competition from the United States during that period was very great. In the past five years the price has fallen by almost the full amount of the duty and the bounty. This year the product of another big furnace will be added. Thus the fruits of the National Policy are fast ripening in the iron industry. The pig iron and steel used in the country are more and more every year the product of Canadian labours.
