OMEMEE, EMILY, Jan. 11, 1897.
Forty-eighth year—First session.
Council met at eleven o'clock a.m., pursuant to Statute.
Present, all the duly elected members for the current year, namely: Reeve, James R. Boate; Deputy Reeve, John J. Mitchell; Councilors, Isaac H. Fee, David M. Kennedy and Dennis Scully.
The above named Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councilors having taken and subscribed the required declaration of qualification and of office, took their seats and proceeded to business.

Moved by Deputy Reeve Mitchell, sec. by Councilor Fee, that the following named persons be appointed to the respective offices as are hereinafter named, in this Municipality for such terms and remuneration as are further hereinafter mentioned, that is to say: R. J. Grandy, Clerk for the current year at a salary of \$185.00.

Wm. H. Curry, Treasurer, for the current year at a salary of \$85.00.
Wm. H. Hooper, to audit the accounts of 1896 at a salary of \$6.00.
Frederick J. Bradd, M. D., Medical Health Officer for the current year at a salary of \$10.00.

And further that the present vacancies in the Local Board of Health, be filled as follows, that is to say: John J. Ashmore, retiring member, reappointed for a term of three years.
Edward Sheridan appointed for a term of two years, in lieu of John J. Mitchell resigned.

And that the remuneration of the members of the Board of Health be fixed at \$2.00 per day for services while employed in connection with the work of said Board, and mileage at the rate of ten cents per mile one way only, and that the Clerk be and is now hereby instructed to draft the usual by-law to this effect.—Carried.

- James C. Leary, deputy returning officer at polling sub-division No. 6, taking poll, mileage and use of polling booth..... 6.40
