THE MOST SUCCESSFUL YET—Such seems to be the general verdict concerning the entertainment under the auspices of the Presbyterian Church, rendered by those who had the pleasure of being present. A gathering of this nature has come to be associated with New Year's day in Omemece, for it is a time honored custom among Presbyterians to specially mark the departure of the old year. An old-time tea-meeting was held in the basement of the church, where from five o'clock until half-past seven refreshments were served by the ladies. The edibles were not lacking in quality or quantity and a very large number partook of supper and enjoyed a couple of social hours previous to the adjournment to Bradburn Hall. And as the people assembled here, to enjoy an excellent and varied programme, the intervening time was made pleasant by selections from a Gramophone, cleverly manipulated by Mr. Lamb, of Ida. Each sound given out by the instrument was very distinctly heard in all parts of the hall.

With Rev. W. M. Kinnaman, B. D. in the chair, the program was begun. Miss Carrie White of Peterboro, a little Miss of ten years, attracted her hearers by her eloquent efforts. Possessed of a wonderful quickness of movement and power of memory, this young lady gives her recitation in a very unique way and with an ability, sometimes lacking in those who are older. All her recitations were excellent but especially did she please the audience with her rendering of "Johnny Canoe."

In the musical line, lovers of what is high class, were afforded a genuine treat when Miss Gross, making her first bow to an Omemece audience, interpreted "Daddy Bucks" "Fear ye not, O Israel." Comment as to the manner of execution is unnecessary as Miss Gross' reputation as a vocalist is already known. In this and the two solos afterwards sung, her enunciation was clear and distinct and the phrasing excellent. She will always be heard, with pleasure Mr. W. J. Sherwood, who is so well known here, kindly consented to appear and gave to his old-time friends little skits from his travels abroad, in a serio-comic vein, proving his descriptive power in words as well as by the artist's brush.

The members of the church, and so auspicious the evening's enjoyment was provided, were pleased to welcome the resident clergy men, representing sister denominations and each had a kindly message of congratulation and good wishes. Rev. Mr. Tenney, of the Anglican Church, left with his listeners as a motto for the coming year—"In the beginning God"—the first four words of the Bible. Rev. T. Brown, of Bethel, urged on the young the necessity of cloaking right convictions in daily life, while Rev. Geo. Brown, in a happy but governed assurance of sympathy in the church's work and referred to some of the elements that go to make up an evangelist.

Master Scott Paton, of Lindsay, favored the audience with a solo which was one of the best items of a good program. He has a clear sweet voice and those who heard him were only sorry that it was impossible for him to give a second number.

This concert was the first occasion on which the Omemece Club made its appearance. This concert of male members only, viz: Messrs. Keith, Wright, McCrea, W. Stevens, K. Jardine, T. Stevenson, R. J. Mulligan, W. J. Kinnaman and J. D. Thornton. Their special selection "O Hal us, ye free," was splendidly given and well received. For encore, "Here's a health to King Charles," followed in equally good style. Twice afterwards did these gentlemen favor the audience, who seemed especially pleased to possess such a creditable home organization, for whom Miss Edith Curry, acted as accompanist. Mr. Hamilton, Organist of St. Andrew's Church, Lindsay, was also present and played the accompaniments for Miss Brown and Master Paton.

Altogether a most enjoyable evening was spent and the success of the opening day of the New Year, is, we trust, an omen of future prosperity.

Frightful Loss of Life.

One of the most disastrous railway accidents that have taken place in Canada in the history of railroading took place on the G. F. R. on the night of the 26th Dec., at Wanstead, a small station 25 miles west of London, O. Twenty-five persons were hurled into eternity by the collision of the G. T. R.-Pacific Express, No. 5, for Chicago, with a freight train. The number of wounded is given as thirty. The express, which left Toronto at 2.10 p.m., was divided, and a train made up at London to run through to Chicago. The number of passengers on board this train was particularly great, on account of returning Christmas visitors. The ill-fated train left London at 9 o'clock, and was behind time.

There is a clear, straight run for miles along that part of the line where the collision occurred, and the express was behind time. The agent at Watford, A. Carson, is said by railway authorities to have neglected instructions and violated the rules of the company hence the accident. Train No. 5 should have been held. Instead of doing so, Carson permitted the train to go by. It flew on, and at ten minutes past ten hurled head on into a fast coming freight train, and as far as learned, 25 persons are lying distorted in death, and numbers are seriously wounded. A special train was immediately made up on receipt of the news at London, and 15 doctors went to the scene of the calamity.

Exact figures cannot be obtained, but the doctors say there are nearly 30 dead, and about 40 injured, numbers of these very severely. —Toronto Star.
