Omemees, Jan. 9th, 1905.

Council met at eleven o'clock, a.m., pursuant to statute. Present the following duly declared elected members that is to say,—James R. Boate, Reeve, and Councillors James Courtney, W. Cottingham, Isaac H. Fee and William Herlihey.

After individually taking and subscribing the required declaration of qualification and of office, the Council proceeded to the transaction of business.

The minutes of last session were read, approved and on motion confirmed. The Reeve then made his annual address to the Council.

The following communications were received, perused and filed, that is to say:—

From J. B. McNeillie, County Treasurer, in compliance with the provisions of the Consolidated Municipal Act, enclosing statement of amounts paid by him to the Treasurer of this Municipality during the year ended 31st Dec. last as follows:

From J. Ross Robertson soliciting donation towards funds of Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto. From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, enclosing copy of proposed by-law to designate the highways to be improved in the County of Victoria under an Act for the improvement of Public Highways, and requesting the Council to consider the proposals contained in the By-law and to communicate their views to him in time for consideration by the County Council at the January session.

From Municipal World, St. Thomas, soliciting renewal of subscriptions thereto for year 1905. From the Clerk of the Township of Cavan with connected Boundary account showing a balance of \$63.43 due said Municipality from Township of Emily. From J. R. McNeillie, County Clerk, advising that in view of the important changes in the Assessment Act, a copy of the Assessors Guide would be sent with the Assessment Rolls for the current year.

Mr. C. W. Richards tendered and solicited a renewal of the printing contract for the current year.

The Clerk was instructed to render an account to the Municipality of Manvers for \$5.25, being one half of the expenditure by Commissioner Fee on Brown's Hill on Boundary between Manvers and Emily.

Moved by Coun I H Fee, sec by Coun W Herlihey, That the contract for printing for the current year, from 15th Dec 1904 to 15th Dec 1905, be awarded to C. W. Richards, at or for the sum of seventy-five dollars, said contract to include all printing and advertising required by the Municipality including the furnishing of all blank forms and printing required by the Clerk or Treasurer. Carried.

Moved by Coun W Herlihey, sec by Coun W Cottingham, That in the matter of the improvement of the Public Highways in the County of Victoria under the Act for this purpose, and in reply to the communication from the County Clerk therein that this Council (while in favor of the securing of all available beneficial grants or means for the improvement of the public highways) yet put themselves on record as not being in favor of such improvement under County supervision, expenditure or assumption, believing that such highways would be more universally improved at a much less expense and the public derive much more benefit therefrom, if all moneys granted or collected for this purpose were placed directly with each Municipal Council for expenditure in their respective Municipalities and therefore that this Council do suggest that a change in the Act be petitioned for, whereby the Government grant might be made directly to each Municipality for expenditure therein, and further that the designation of the roads in the proposed by-law as far as this Municipality is concerned be not concurred in and that the passing of such by-law be and is hereby objected to. Carried.
