### ESSAY.

The following is an essay given by Mrs. Cochrane at the E. L. of C. E., on Friday evening last, and published by request of Rev. Newton Hill. It gives a complete history of the churches and pastors since the first church was built in Omemse, and gives other information that will no doubt be highly appreciated by a large number of our readers :-- ]

LOYALTY TO OUR CHURCH. Ref: "If I ferget Thee, Oh Jerusalem let my right hand forget her cunning." The passage here quoted is the language of loyalty. The people of God were in captivity and had to endure many privations. They could not go to the sanctuary as was their custom. 
