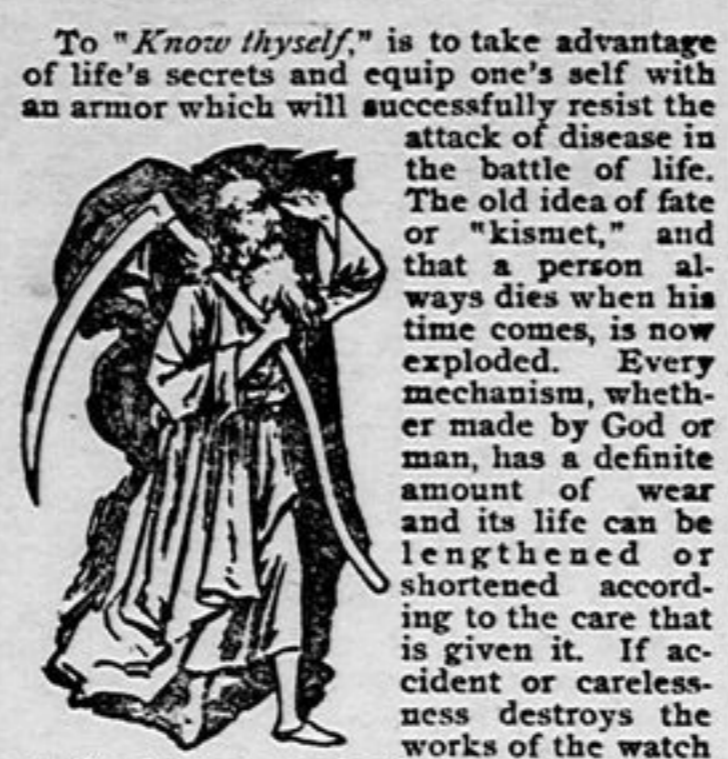

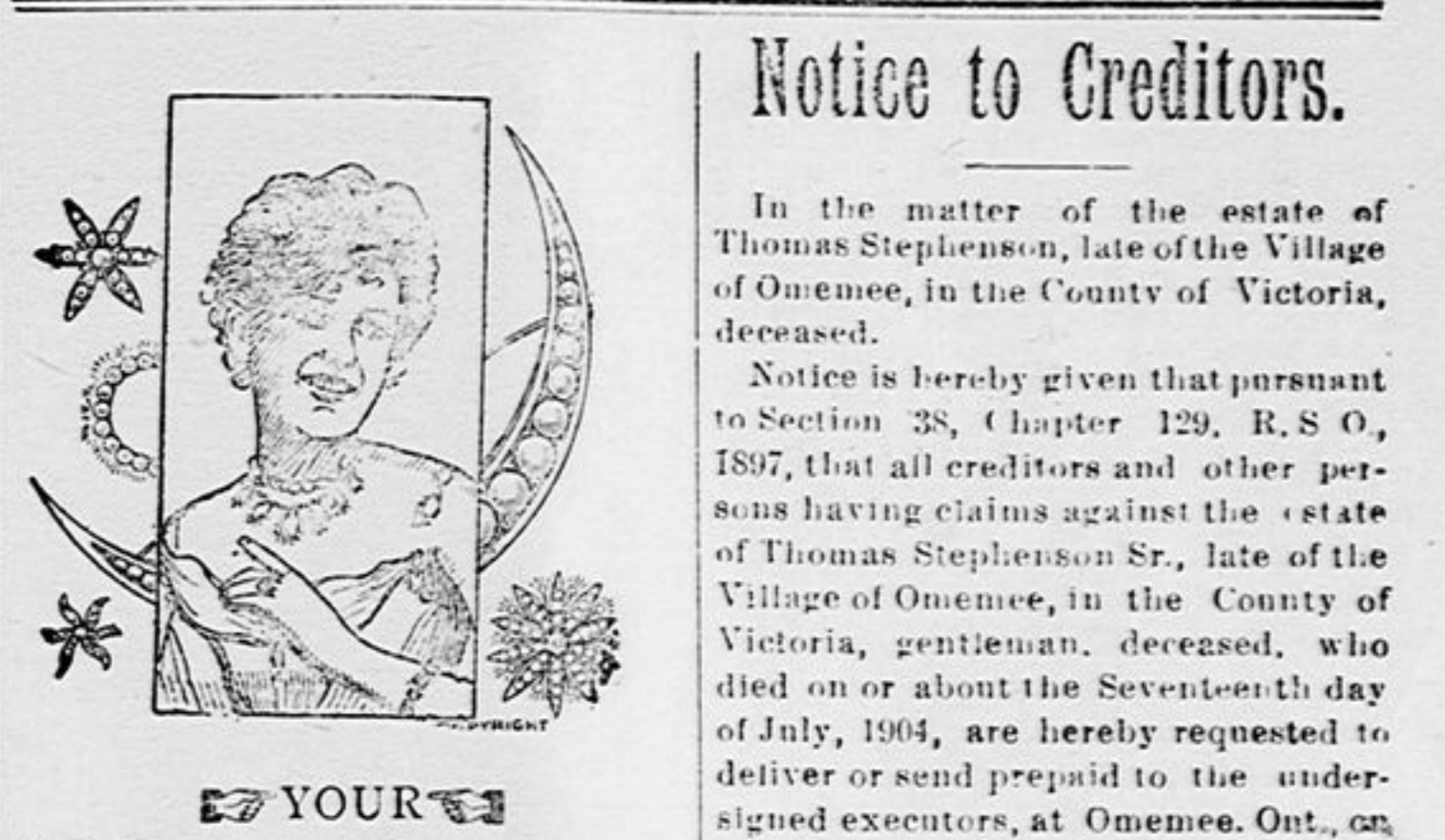

Plain Talk to the Bishop by the Downeyville People.

At a Meeting After His Lordship's Recent Sermon, some Church Members Spoke Their Mind.

In view of the fact that Bishop O'Connor's recent sermon at Downeyville induced the advocates of the Public School to forsake their position, and withdraw their suit to recover the deed from the Separate School board, the Toronto lawyer who was acting with Mr. I. E. Weldon in the case, was not in a position to go ahead when the case was called on Thursday of last week at Osgoode Hall, and the presiding judge struck it off the list.

It transpires that a meeting of the members of the Downeyville congregation chiefly interested in the case was called by the Bishop in the sacristy of the church after the sermon a week ago last Sunday. The whole matter was talked over, and apparently in a quiet frank way.

"What we want here is a new priest," bluntly remarked Mr. Bernard Murray who was a leader in the Public School cause, and was greatly displeased with Father Bretherton's course.

"We need a new burying ground worse than a Separate School," said another.

"You won't need any burying ground at all if you don't stop your opposition to the Separate School" was the alleged answer of Bishop O'Connor.

The two school boards at Downeyville have resigned, and a new board been elected by the joint reconciled factions. Those elected are: Thos. Lucas who was a member of the resigned Public School board; E. Costello, a new man, but a former Separate School supporter; and J. Carroll, a new man, but formerly favorable to the Public School.

The law provides that where a Separate School is established it shall have power to levy on all within a radius of three miles. The Separate School people, the down there say they will not take advantage of that at present but will be satisfied with control of the present section. There is, however, a section on either side of that one, which it is expected an effort will soon be made to convert in Separate School sections; for it is said that Father Bretherton is acting on the order of the Pope, that whenever the circumstances permit, Separate Schools shall be established.

Inspector Knight says that the establishment of a Separate school does not mean that the Public School section ceases to exist. It only means that a Separate School exists in the Public School section. The school property still belongs to the township as Public School property.--Watchman-Wiarder.

Princess Victoria Undergoes Surgical Operation.

Was Suffering From Appendicitis--The Royal Patient Progressing Favorably.

London, Jan. 31.--The Princess Victoria, daughter of King Edward, underwent an operation for appendicitis at Buckingham Palace this morning. The operation was performed by Sir Frederick Treves, surgeon-in-ordinary to the King.

A bulletin subsequently issued says: "The circumstances of the operation were very favorable. The Princess bore it very well, and is progressing very satisfactorily."

The Princess, who has been ill for some time, came to London January 27 to prepare for the operation. She was born in 1868--Globe of yesterday.
