CAVAN COUNCIL.

Council Chamber, Cavan.
Monday, February 6th, 1905.
The Council met at 11 o'clock a.m. this day pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. The Reeve in the Chair.

The minutes of the last Council meeting and Court of Revision re Long Swamp Drainage By-law meetings were read, approved and signed.

The following communications were read, viz: From the C.P.R. E. I. I. Company, respecting assessment and asking the Council to assume control of the road leading to Cavanville Station which the Company opened up in 1854. From the G.T.R. Company respecting assessment. From the Bell Telephone Company, requesting that all notices of assessment to be transmitted by registered letter, be addressed "The Bell Telephone Company of Canada, Limited, Ontario Department, Hamilton, Ont." From the National Sanitary Association, Toronto, asking for a grant to the Hospital for Consumptives From the Municipal Corporation of the County of York, asking the cooperation of other Municipalities to ask the Provincial Legislature to amend the Provincial Act governing the speed of Motor Vehicles on highways by placing this power in the hands of Municipal Councils. From Hospital for Sick Children acknowledging grant of \$5.00 from Cavan Council towards this fund. From Provincial Board of Health acknowledging receipt of annual report of Cavan Board of Health. From Messrs Wood & Gundy, Toronto, respecting purchasing debentures, from Messrs Jenks & Dresser, Sarnia, respecting Steel Bridges, from Messrs James Paul, Martyn Brock and Edward Keegan, asking application for the office of Assessor of the township of Cavan for the current year, all of which were laid on the table Mr David Armstrong also made application verbally for the said office of Assessor.

Moved by Conn. Kelly, sec by Conn. Shield, That Mr. George Campbell, Treasurer of the Township of Cavan, be instructed to borrow as required not to exceed One Thousand dollars, for Township purposes. Carried.

On motion Mr R Vance was allowed to present a petition signed by several ratepayers, requesting the Council to rescind By-law No. 306, passed March 2nd 1891, whereby the dog tax was taken off.

Moved by Conn. Staples, sec by Conn. Kelly, That the Council pay \$3 each for polling booths at the Legislative Election on January 28th, 1906. Moved in amendment by Conn. Shaw, sec by Conn. Shield, That the Council only pay the sum of \$2.00 each for said polling booths. The Amendment carried.

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Emily Council Proceedings.

Omeme, Emily, Feb. 6th, 1905.
Council met at ten o'clock, a.m., pursuant to adjournment. Present all the members, the Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of the last session were read, approved and on motion confirmed.

The following communications were received, perused and filed, that is to say:—

From Secretary of the Home for the Aged, Lindsay, enclosing and account amounting to \$73.60, for maintenance of Julia Sullivan and Peter Waters for half-year ending on 31st December 1904.

From the Grand Trunk Railway Company and Bell Telephone Company with required notices for Assessment, in compliance with new Assessment Act.

From Good Roads Machinery Company re purchase of road making machinery.

From the Omeme High and Public School Board inviting Council to attend the opening of the new school building on 10th Feb. inst.

From Charles Cornell applying for re-appointment as Collector of Taxes. Application for re-appointment as Assessor was received from Robert W Wilson.

The Auditors report was presented by Mr. Wm. H. Lohane.

The Clerk was instructed to render to the township of Ops, an itemized account of expenditure by Councilor Courtney on the west boundary to date and to request payment of one-half the same as usual.

Moved by Conn. James Courtney, sec by Conn. William Herlihy, That the following Township Officials be appointed, that is to say:

Charles Cornell, as collector of taxes at a salary of..... 105 00
William H Curry, as treasurer at a salary of..... 95 00
Richard J Grandy, as township Clerk at a salary of..... 225 00
Robert W Wilson, as Assessor at a salary of..... 65 00
and that the Clerk do now draft the usual by-law confirming these appointments. Carried.

Moved by Conn. W Cottingham, sec by Conn. J Courtney, That in the opinion of this Council, the time fixed for the making and completion of the assessment by the "Assessment Act," is not the proper time for the making of such assessment, consequent upon the lands during the greater portion of such period being covered with snow, and the assessor being unable to make the required personal examination and observation necessary to arrive at a proper valuation and assessment of such lands for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the new assessment act, and whereas it would appear that under section 56 of the said Act, the County Council is empowered to pass a By-law for the taking of such assessment in towns, townships and villages between the first day of February and the first day of July, that the said County Council be and is hereby petitioned to pass a By-law whereby the assessment in this Municipality of the Township of Emily may be taken between the said first day of February and the first day of July in the present year, if possible, in order that such assessment may be utilized for Municipal purposes for the year 1906, and that this resolution be engrossed in duplicate signed by the Reeve and Clerk and the corporate seal attached and one copy of same forwarded to the County Clerk for presentation to the aforesaid County Council.

PASSED at the Village of Omeme this sixth day of February, 1905.

Moved by Conn. W Herlihy, sec by Conn. W Cottingham, That in connection with the line fence award between Simeon Perdue and Patrick A Devine, and that portion of same setting forth the costs of such award should be paid by the said Patrick A Devine, that the aforesaid Patrick A Devine be notified by the Clerk to pay the allowance of two dollars each to Thomas Tronney, Patrick Herlihy and Timothy Morrissey, the fenceviewers employed therein, otherwise this Council will pay same and collect such disbursements in taxes for the present year as per the Consolidated Municipal Act. Carried.

Moved by Conn. Isaac H Fee, sec by Conn. William Cottingham, That the Auditors report as presented be received and adopted, and that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to have two hundred copies of same printed for distribution. Carried.
