commenced to practice his profession in Peterborough, and at the time of his death had a large practice, which was increasing. His record was one seldom achieved—a young man coming into his native town to practice medicine and in a few years securing such an extensive practice as his was. He was twice married. His first wife, Miss Zetta McCall, to whom he was married in 1888, died about six years ago. About three years ago he was united in marriage to Miss Blackwell, of Omemee, who, with an infant boy, survives him. His father, and four brothers and one sister, Mrs. (Dr.) Graham, of Fenelon Falls, are also left to mourn his sad and unexpected demise. The deceased had been a surgeon under the appointment of the county for several years, and was also town physician and medical health officer for the township of North Monaghan. In the practice of his profession, besides his skill as a physician and surgeon, he possessed a sympathetic, kindly manner which made his patients his warm friends. His removal is a loss to the medical profession and to the community at large.

The deceased was a member of the Peterborough Lodge, A. F. and A. M., and of Court Peterborough, Canadian Order of Foresters, but at his own request the funeral was not conducted under society auspices. The funeral took place from the family residence, corner of George and Murray-sts., Peterborough, at 2:30 o'clock on Friday afternoon.—Review.
