Omemee, Emily, Feb. 6th, 1899.
Fiftieth year, Second session.
Council met ten o'clock a. m. pursuant to adjournment.
Present all the members, the Reeve in the chair.
The minutes of last session were read approved and confirmed.
The following communications were received, perused and laid on the table:
From William R. McQuade making application for appointment as Assessor at a salary of fifty dollars.
From Henry Carroll making application for appointment as Assessor at a salary of sixty dollars.
From Charles Cornell making application for appointment as Collector of taxes. Mr. Wm. H. Lebane appeared and presented the Auditor's Report.
Moved by Councillor Boate, seconded by Councillor Scully, that the Auditor's Report as presented be received and adopted and that the Clerk be and is hereby instructed to have two hundred copies of the same printed for distribution.—Carried.
Moved by Councillor Scully, seconded by Councillor Boate, that the following named persons be appointed to the several offices hereinafter named in this Municipality for the current year at such salaries as are also hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:
R. J. Grandy, Clerk at a salary of one hundred and eighty-five dollars.
Wm. H. Curry, Treasurer at a salary of eighty-five dollars.
Chas. Cornell, Collector of Taxes at a salary of one hundred and five dollars.
Wm. R. McQuade, Assessor at a salary of fifty dollars, and that the Clerk do draft the usual by-law confirming such appointments.
Moved in amendment by Councillor Boate, seconded by Councillor Kennedy, that the hereinafter named persons be appointed to the several following positions as hereinafter mentioned in this Municipality for the current year at the following salaries, namely:
R. J. Grandy, Clerk at a salary of one hundred and eighty-five dollars.
Wm. H. Curry, Treasurer at a salary of eighty-five dollars.
Chas. Cornell, Assessor and Collector of Taxes at a salary of one hundred and sixty-five dollars and that the Clerk do prepare the usual by-law confirming these appointments. Original motion carried, the Reeve giving the casting vote in favor of same.
Moved by Councillor Boate, seconded by Councillor Scully, that by-law number 298 for the purpose of confirming the appointment of the Clerk, the Treasurer, the Collector of Taxes and the Assessor for the current year at the several salaries as named therein be now introduced and read a first time.—Carried.

Chas. Sherrow, indigent expenditure under supervision of J. J. Blackwell 3.00
J. Ross Robertson for Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto 5.00

Dominion Cattle, Sheep and Swine Breeders' Associations.
Very successful meetings of the Dominion Cattle, Sheep and Swine Breeders' Associations were held in Toronto from February 7th to 10th inclusive. The memberships of the Associations are at least twenty-five per cent. greater than at any previous period. The efforts of the Associations during the past year have been along the line of cheaper transportation. At present between local points in Ontario, thoroughbred stock in less than car load lots is shipped at one-half the regular tariff rate. Between Ontario and Manitoba and British Columbia the rates are now to Winnipeg, \$72 and to New Westminster, \$196, where formerly they were to Winnipeg, \$130 and to New Westminster, \$251. The privilege has been granted of allowing thoroughbred calves, sheep or swine, in less than car load lots of over three, to be penned off one end of the car without being crated. For a long time this has been a standing grievance of the live stock men throughout Ontario.
Interprovincial trade in Pure bred stock from Ontario westward to Manitoba and the Northwest and British Columbia, and eastward to the maritime Provinces and Newfoundland has been very large. The trade has been greatly assisted by the Associations, both by reduced rates and also by making up car loads of shipments already sold, thus obtaining for the small shipper a car load rate. It is estimated by those who are in a position to speak advisedly that the interprovincial trade in pure bred stock has increased five fold during the past year. For the past two years the Associations have been advertising in the Ontario Agricultural Gazette the names of the members of the Live Stock Association giving a list of the stock each has for sale. These lists have been placed in the hands of breeders throughout all Canada and it has been to a great extent owing to these lists of stock for sale that the interprovincial trade has been so large. If possible during the coming year these lists will be so extended that they will be published in the maritime provinces and throughout Manitoba and Northwest. The Associations have already done good work along the lines of transportation and by advertising in the Ontario stock throughout Canada, it is felt that considerably more work along this line can yet be done which will result in the ultimate benefit to this Province.
